

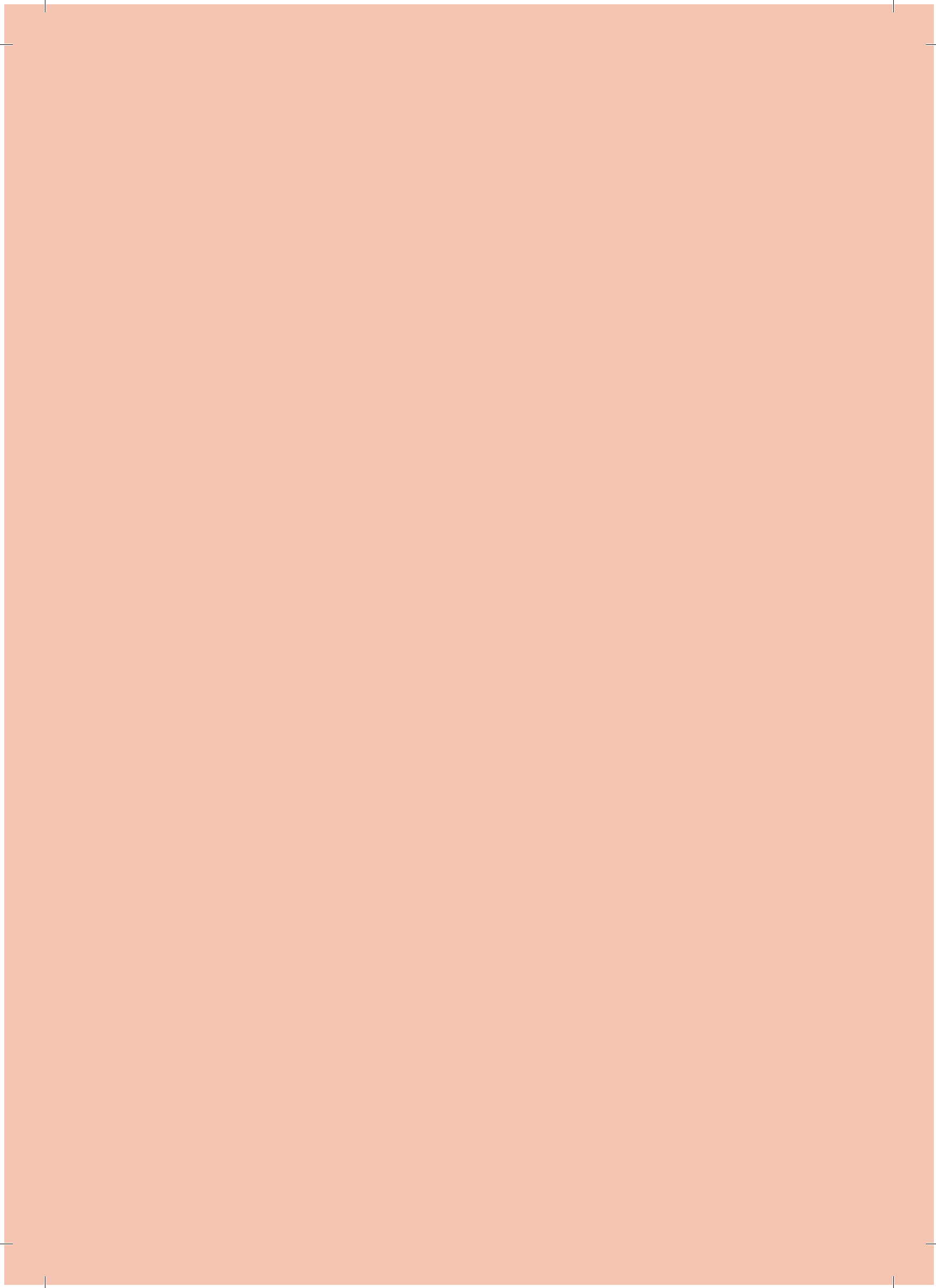

BUNÓRDAITHE

In order that the proceedings of the Convention be carried out without delay the following Standing Orders will be observed.

1. The proposer of a motion or an amendment thereto may speak for five, but not more than five minutes.
2. A delegate speaking to a resolution or an amendment must not exceed three minutes.
3. The proposer of a resolution or amendment may speak for a second time for five minutes before a vote is taken, but no other delegate may speak for a second time to the same resolution or amendment.
4. The Chairman may at any time he considers a matter sufficiently discussed call on the proposer for a reply, and when this has been given a vote must be taken.
5. A delegate may with the consent of the Chairman move 'that the question now be put' after which, when a proposer has spoken, a vote must be taken.
6. Convention shall not be entitled to consider any matter not on the Agenda, except with the consent of a majority comprising two-thirds of the votes of those present, voting and entitled to vote

Tuarascáil an Rúnaí



Let us first note, before this brief look back at the past year, the combined efforts that can be seen at all levels of Cork GAA. If this report fails to acknowledge individual contributions, it is by intent, as the naming of any persons would simply serve to exclude others amongst the army of volunteers and staff who served our games with honour since we last wrote. Similarly, in terms of those who passed in 2022, while some irreplaceable figures were lost to us and left gaps in our hearts that cannot be filled, to identify individuals would be to sideline others who made similar unknowable contributions amongst our hundred and fifty clubs.

2022 was a year of continued progress and while success eluded our teams on the field, solid foundations were once more put in place in order to reap a sustainable dividend in the coming years. Combined profits of €1.95m was a tribute to success of the County Championships, Rebels' Bounty and the increasing commercial opportunities being availed of in both our games and our stadia. The stabilisation of the County Board's finances gathered further pace with profits of €0.7m, while the stadium showed its potential with profits of €1.25m (EBITDA).

Inter-county Teams

On the games side, the Cork Senior Hurlers showed improvement during a League campaign which ended on a sour note with a heavy defeat to Waterford. When this was compounded by two lackluster defeats to Limerick and Clare in the Munster Championship, the die seemed cast for the season. However, the true colours of the side finally came to light with a defiant victory over Waterford in Walsh Park, before a clear-cut victory over Tipperary in Thurles. A change in tactical approach as well as a more robust approach by the players marked a turning point for this team. While many felt that the subsequent championship exit to Galway showed a return of previous failings, anyone present in Thurles that day would have to hold a different view. Quite simply, the courage and fight shown by players on a day when everything that could go wrong, did go wrong, showed that this group clearly has unfinished business. With the continued integration of the All Ireland Minor and U20 winning sides of recent seasons, the graph is still upwards for this group and if the spirit and aggression shown in patches can be sustained throughout a full season, success may not be so far away, after all.

For the Cork Senior Footballers, a dreadful start to the year with injuries and poor performances didn't bode well for a successful season. However, renewed momentum and perhaps a less difficult programme of games against fellow relegation strugglers towards the end of the League, culminated in a stunning last-gasp victory over Offaly in Tullamore. This guaranteed Division 2 status as well as participation in Sam Maguire. Of course, the run-in to the Championship was dominated by the saga regarding the venue for the Munster semi-final versus Kerry. Much commentary surrounded this matter. Suffice to say that the position of the players, which was fully backed by the County Board was

understandable, as was the desire of the Munster Council to provide appropriate venues for all games under their jurisdiction. Ultimately, the fixture was a success, with an attendance of 10,000 ensuring a sufficiently hostile atmosphere, and in turn, a much-improved performance from the home side. While defeat meant entry to the qualifiers, it was heartening to see the Cork Senior footballers once more connect with their supporters. This was followed by a favourable draw in the qualifiers with home venue secured for the visits of Limerick and Louth, both of whom were defeated. While defeat followed versus Dublin, on an evening when the gap to the top teams was laid bare, the year marked a step in the right direction. That said, such moral victories will count for nothing next season in the bear-pit of Division 2, where promotion must be the objective.

One disappointing aspect which was common to both the “Páirc Uí Rinn or nowhere” saga and the aftermath of the hurlers’ defeat to Galway were the false rumours pedaled regarding the position of the County Officers on various matters. Unfortunately, such mischief making was clearly designed to create a divide between players and the Board and certainly had no motive in the betterment of Cork Hurling or Football.

At underage level, both Cork Minor and U20 Hurlers will consider 2022 a year that slipped away. The Minors found themselves out of the championship after just one defeat, on a night when an array of wides cost them dearly and with a rather strange format nationally doing them no favours either. It was certainly no fault of management who left no stone unturned despite the effect of two seasons affected by Covid. Leaving Páirc Uí Rinn that night, one couldn’t help but feel that another month of preparation would have seen them right. The U20s met a similar fate, never getting their best fifteen on the field due to injuries and unavailability, until it was too late. That said, the work done by this management team over a number of years will still show dividends and a sea of talent is now clearly emerging from this level.

Meanwhile, the U20 footballers also saw their player group decimated by injuries, with the team proving a pale shadow of the All Ireland winning Minor team of three years previously. Despite this, there was tremendous courage shown by a young team down in Tralee and again, many individuals from this group will progress to Senior despite missing out in 2022. The Minor footballers bounced back from defeat to Kerry in the earlier round with a stunning victory in the Munster Final in Páirc Uí Rinn. Subsequent to this, defeat to Derry showed, once more, the requirement for our underage football teams to get regular, meaningful action against teams outside the province. Indeed, one hopes that the reforms that will hopefully be seen in Senior football formats over the next decade will be replicated at underage level. Of course, we hope that these will be at U18 rather than U17 level, with the up and down nature of performances at U17 clearly showing that the players involved are simply too young for the rigours of inter-county championships.

We still long for the widescale reforms that would transform the Senior football championships and hope that new formats in place for 2023 may represent a step in the right direction. Finally, while the split season will require another full year before making a final judgement, it may yet represent the GAA’s finest moment in catering for all her sons and restoring our greatest players back to their communities while there is still life and

light in the summer evenings. For those who decry the lack of national interest in any particular game being played in some far-off corner of the country. That's the whole point. It's a local delicacy. And all the more important to cherish for that.

Club Competitions

Now in its third year, the new County Championship format is beginning to bear fruit. Teams have renewed hope and energy, the standard is rising and the supporters have returned. Regular, meaningful, competitive games remains the mantra and we look forward to continuing such reforms in the lower grades. For example, in 2023 the County Junior C football championship will be played under the same format as the Premier Senior championship despite there being six more grades in between. One hope that the three pillars of the 2019 reforms, namely group stages, relegation and reduced teams will continue make every ball count in the championships to come.

With eighteen County Championships now concluded after the completion of the JAHC Final on Sunday, the number will rise to nineteen for 2023 with the introduction of the Premier Junior Football grade. No report could include tributes to all winners, who are recorded elsewhere in the report and one simply hopes that, whether clubs were upwardly or downwardly mobile in 2022, they will face into next year with hope and hard work.

With the County Championship draws for 2023 taking place at Convention, all formats are included elsewhere in the annual report and all players are assured that they will have a full schedule of games with times, dates and venues, well before the turkey is braised.

Underage grades

Without doubt, the most pressing matter facing the County is in finding a solution to the issue of ages grades for the player cohort aged 17 to 20. Unfortunately, a lack of decisiveness on this complex matter has led to a further confusion. If we are to put the needs of our young players first, there is no doubt that Minor at both Club and County level should be returned to U18 with full decoupling. The challenges faced by the U19 competitions in 2022 showed clear evidence that the overlapping of adult and underage games involving the same players is unworkable.

As a member of a club that failed to field at U17, U19 or U21 level in 2022 due to a lack of numbers caused by the effects of rural depopulation, the matter of participation is of particular interest. For clubs such as my own, facing uncertainty in terms of our very existence, cherry-picking the chosen eighteen-year-olds for our adult teams is the road to ruin. We must bring them all through. The restoration of Minor to U18 will give them an extra year with their colleagues and then they will all be able to graduate 'en masse' to the adult club when they are all ready. Claims of decoupling damaging the future prospects of the small club simply ring hollow. In fact, as well as reducing dropout, it will increase the

chances of players in their 20s and 30s playing for longer with their clubs. Decoupling at 18 increases participation. Increased participation is good for every size of club.

Meanwhile, let's spare a thought for the eighteen-year-old from the urban centre. Picture the dual-winning Douglas U17 team of 2022. How many of those boys, most of them now in 5th year in school are ready to play at adult level in 2023? And now we must tell them that their underage career is over. And let's spare a thought for their colleagues on the second string Douglas U17 team. Where do they go? An easy answer without decoupling. Another group to cast to the GAA dropout graveyard, a site which is well populated by now.

Single-code enthusiasts who continue to ply the populist notion that a games programme can facilitate players lining out at both Minor and Adult level without decoupling, remind us of those in the political sphere with snake oil promises of increased national spending while cutting taxes. Perhaps they might consider the Cork games programme where an adult dual player will play a standard minimum of 24 competitive games, before adding this workload to a Minor player with a similar programme at their own level.

One simply begs our clubs to act in the interests of our young players and the long-term viability of our clubs. This can be done by supporting the relevant motion put forward on behalf of the County Committee at Convention. U18 and U20 at Club and County, with full decoupling at U18.

Refereeing

An impending shortage of referees was highlighting last year's report. Interestingly, as the quality goes up, with refereeing standards at an all-time high, the numbers being recruited, while not insignificant, appear insufficient to meet the increasing volume of games. That said, it appears that the Association is finally about to embrace a far stricter disciplinary code which would in turn encourage and empower referees. Once this is followed by clubs no longer bringing spurious cases ahead of Hearing subcommittees, the future could suddenly appear brighter. Our own plans to take the referees report fully online will also help in the efficiency of reporting and help to close possible loopholes in the disciplinary process.

Páirc Uí Chaoimh

After three years affected by both the failure of the original pitch and then Covid 19, the stadium finally began to fulfill its potential in 2022. The visits of Ed Sheeran, Elton John and Westlife brought a whole new audience to the stadium, while the historical opening for the Rugby match between Munster and South Africa showed how much things have changed. Our sincere thanks to Central Council for granting the necessary authority. While we will continue to do 'friendly battle' with our colleagues in other sports for the hearts and minds of the next generation of players, our real obstacles are those faced by boys and girls who don't in fact play any sport. Dropout, the sedentary nature of modern life and obesity should keep one awake at night far more than the image of an oval shaped ball bouncing around the Páirc.

Of equal significance was the arrival of eighty international applicants for a month-long stay at the stadium in the Autumn. The opening of our doors for this programme showed the GAA at its core. 'Where we all belong'. Following on from the Covid-19 testing and vaccination programmes at the stadium, it represented a third occasion on which the facility served the wider community. And without exclusion.

Of course, all such non-GAA activity was well-balanced by the opportunity of so many of our clubs to take to the hallowed sod for club games. Over thirty club games were played there across the Autumn, incorporating knockout games and finals from Junior B to Premier Senior. Perhaps the highlight was seeing an astonishing crowd of fifteen thousand supporters of all ages braving the plague-like downpours to attend the Premier Senior Hurling Final such was the renewed interest in the club game. And the noisiest? Probably the four weeks of Sciath Na Scol Finals where the tears, cheers and laughter flowed amongst our most cherished members.

Away from the games, Páirc Uí Chaoimh continues to face a challenging future. Despite healthy profits this year, the legacy debt from the stadium redevelopment continues to rest well above the €0 million mark. Predictions that the stadium would open debt-free now seem like a distant memory and all efforts must be made to clear the shortfall by those now charged with its management. Passing the debt onto the next generation doesn't bear thinking. Therefore, an action plan continues to be implemented in conjunction with all associates and we will be calling on members to support all commercial aspects under the Cork GAA umbrella. The sooner the stadium is placed on a firm financial footing, the sooner we can move on to future projects, for example, the much-required training centre for our teams.

What is also certain is that All Ireland winning teams will represent the best opportunity that the stadium will be filled more regularly. Therefore, members can be assured that nothing is being short-changed on the playing side, despite the mortgage overhang. That said, the provision of training pitches continues to present challenges, hence the requirement for some blue-sky thinking on same.

Looking Forward

Alongside the continued repayment of the stadium debt and the conclusion of other matters arising from the redevelopment, 2023 will see further movement on many fronts, in no particular order: the continued strategic development of structures under both the County Committee and Stadium Board under the headings of Commercial, Facilities, Finance, Games Development, Games Administration and Senior teams; opposition to the bus corridor plans on Boreenmana Road which would render Páirc Uí Rinn no longer suitable for games; efforts to replicate the success of Rebels' Bounty over the past two years, during which revenue of €5.7m has been accumulated; continued expansion of the commercial partner base with plans to build upon the very generous partners on board, so far; increased investment in Games Development in line with increased national funding, allowing us to put more 'boots on the ground' in schools and clubs and increase

participation and performance; the continued expansion of One Cork and the recruitment of expert volunteers in the areas of commercial and development; and finally, to support and drive efforts towards full integration with Camogie and Ladies Football.

To conclude, it remains an honour to serve such a vibrant sporting and community organisation, which for all the aspects we would wish to improve upon, continues to stand apart as a beacon of integrity and generosity throughout the world, and where all members are cherished equally.

This is unfair on the media, whom we depend on to promote our games and on our patrons who support us by their attendance adding colour and excitement to the match occasions.

It is important that team announcements are done in a timely fashion to help promote discussion among our patrons on the merits of team selection and ultimately encourage larger attendances at our games. A special word of thanks to IT officer, Terry Brady for his support and guidance throughout the year.

Match Programmes

The job of producing match programmes for home Inter County League and all club championship games played at Pairc Ui Chaoimh and Pairc Ui Rinn falls under the remit of the county PRO. While it is a demanding part of the role, it is very enjoyable.

insure the smooth task of programme sales was completed.

The 2022 Yearbook went to print the week after my election twelve months ago.

However, as my business experience has taught me, everything doesn't go to plan.

The role of a Cork GAA PRO is hugely challenging and time consuming for a volunteer but also very satisfying. When one is self-employed, to strike a balance between running one's business and volunteer work for Cork GAA can be onerous.

encouragement. A special word of thanks to my son, Cathal, who has become my "wing man" covering the Website and social media posts.

Covid 19 has had a huge impact on all GAA activity over the past three years. While field games have returned to normality, off field activity within clubs is only now beginning to awaken from a long enforced dormant period. During recent months I have been working with Croke Park personnel, the Munster Council Planning and Training Committee and some Cork clubs, to set-up a timeline for the completion of the club planning that had begun in late 2019 and early 2020.

Following a reminder to clubs, at recent Co. Board meetings, of the need for planning at local level, a number of units have signalled that they wish to commence or revise strategic plans to adequately reflect their vision for the club going forward.

The Gaelic Athletic Association's Strategic Plan for the period 2022 to 2026 has five main priorities.

- (1) Maximum participation among players, coaches, referees and officers
- (2) A sustainable Association with thriving clubs and officers at its core
- (3) Six codes, one Association
- (4) A connected and inclusive Association
- (5) Good governance among GAA unit

Club Planning and Officer Training will need to be at the forefront of all club

members thinking, if the GAA's vision for the Association is to be achieved by 2026. Online Officer Training was offered to all clubs in early 2022. 178 Cork Officers availed of this and most people found it very helpful. However a large number of our clubs failed to have any officers included in this worthwhile activity. There is a suggestion that, in the coming years, clubs may need to have participated in Officer Training if they wish to avail of full grants. Another suggestion is that there may be a bonus percentage, included in grants, for clubs that have participated in the training process. Online training for club officers for 2023 takes place on 26th. of January 2023. All clubs will be notified on how to access these webinars in early 2023.

I would like to thank the following people who have been available as facilitators, for the strategic planning process in clubs and indeed continue to make themselves available into the future- Leo Lowney, Don Hegarty, Kieran McGann, John Quirke, Michael Byrne and Jim Hanley.

I have been heavily involved in all activities in Páirc Uí Chaoimh during 2022. The position of Safety Officer for the Stadium has huge responsibilities attached, especially for large attendances at games and concerts. I'm also involved in ensuring that the Stadium and the GAA property adjacent is always kept in pristine condition. We are fortunate that we have some excellent people that work all hours to maintain the pitch and the stadium in top class condition.

Our gratitude also to the Event Team ,the many voluntary stewards ,office staff, and security who have helped during the year. I look forward to working as a volunteer, to help Coiste Chontae Chorcaí, Cumann Lúthchleas Gael, Páirc Uí Chaoimh and all clubs in 2023.

Effective use of Information Technology and appropriate management of data and information is critical to the success of GAA Clubs. Online activity continues to grow in use and have become vitally important in terms of communication of events and results to our members and supporters. In 2022, we continued the officer training on the GAA platforms with online training. The plan for 2023 is that there will be a return to the classroom style training as well as online training.



The Cork County Board digital transformation journey continued in 2022 with online ticket sales for matches and enhancements to the website. Clubs can update their Club Officers and Club mentor's information through a portal which will feed the updated information to the Cork GAA websites in real time.

Cork County Board are now firmly on a digital transformation journey which the goal to reduce workloads on officers and making sure information is secure and protected and backed up. This is an ongoing journey with further developments in 2023 planned. The Rebelsbounty application was enhancing giving each Club a portal to access their own information, which proved a remarkable success with online sales reaching over 60% of total sales

It is vital for the maintenance of the profile of Cork G.A.A. that every club continuously embraces all forms of communication, maintain, and develop its links within the community it serves. The centralised roll out of Foireann continued with online vetting integrated with membership rolled out. Further updates will be rolled out in the coming weeks and months. The IT support is available to clubs and officers to assist them in this digital age.

I like to thank the Cork County Board for their commitment to the Digital transformation journey. I would also like to thank the IT committee for their input, commitment, and hard work over the year.

The last two years have been quiet with Developments, but I am glad to report that a lot of clubs are now back on track and clubs are now looking at developing their facilities again. Cork can be very proud of their clubs as the facilities in Cork County are some of the best in the country.

Croke Park Loans

For the first time in three years, Croke Park reopened this scheme. Eight clubs in Cork applied for loans and were successful to the amount of €100,000.00 at a rate of 1.9%. This is very worthwhile for clubs. It is hoped to have this facility available again in 2023.

Development Grants 2022

Munster Council reopened their Development Grants for the first time since 2019. A total of fifty two clubs from the County applied for Grants and we are waiting patiently for the news on this. It is hoped that Clubs will get good news on their application before the first week of December. I had the pleasure of visiting a lot of clubs this year and it is great to see the amount of work being carried out by all the clubs throughout the County and their facilities are a credit to them. Keep up the good work!

Health & Safety Audit

Croke Park have appointed a new National Health & Safety Officer and I was delighted to have met up with him this year. It is the aim of the Association to have all the Clubs

audited throughout the country in the next three years. Claims are now a big burden on the Association and it is hoped with this new initiative that they will see a falloff in these. Four Cork Clubs were audited this year- Clonakilty, Nemo Rangers, Bishopstown and Mallow. The Auditor was very impressed with the facilities they audited and I would like to thank the four clubs for their effort and congratulate them on a job well done. So to all the Clubs- keep up the good effort.

We are lucky in Cork to have two fine sporting venues. The new surface in Páirc Uí Chaoimh received The Pitch Of The Year 2022 and this is a credit to everyone involved. It is my great privilege to report as Children's Officer to the Annual Convention of Coiste Chontae Chorcaí 2022. I would particularly like to thank my fellow officers, the staff of Cork GAA and particularly the Children's Officers in all of our clubs. The expertise and guidance of Gearóid Ó Maolmhíchíl and his staff in Croke Park was a tremendous support during the year. Gearóid visited us recently in Páirc Uí Chaoimh and he addressed the adult and Rebel Óg CCCs and Hearings Committees as well as representatives of Cork Camogie and Cork LGFA on the GAA Code of Behaviour (Underage) and on related issues. This was a very informative session and gave all present much food for thought. I would also like to thank Des Cullinane of the National Child Welfare Committee for his invaluable advice and support throughout the year.

There is an onus on club officers and on clubs to support their children's officers in their work and to ensure that any safeguarding issues and non-compliance with the Code of Behaviour are handled sensitively, promptly and in a fair manner at club Executive meetings. All clubs are legally obliged to be fully up to date with child welfare requirements. Our children's officers must be fully supported and resourced and please ensure that Child

Welfare is on the agenda at every club executive meeting and at all underage committee meetings. It would greatly improve the ease of communication on Child Welfare issues if all club Children's Officers are using the official GAA email address for children's officers. I appeal to all club executives to ensure that your children's officer has access to this GAA email. Club secretaries only via their official email address can use the link to request this access. Contact me at **childrensofficer.cork@gaa.ie** if you require the link to give your children's officer to be given official email access if you have not already done so.

Legally all coaches/ mentors of players under 18 years of age must be fully compliant with GAA Child Welfare Regulations and with the GAA Code of Behaviour Underage. In order to be **fully compliant with GAA Child Welfare requirements** all of the above coaches must be **Garda Vetted**, have completed **Safeguarding 1 training** within the last three years and have at least completed the **Introduction to Coaching Gaelic Games course**. **Otherwise you are not legally permitted to be involved with non-adult players.** There is also an onus on all clubs to ensure that all mentors/ coaches of non-adult players are made fully aware each year of the Child Safeguarding procedures as well as the Association's **Code of Behaviour** in particular **Section 3 of the Code on Maintaining Good Practice**. **I would urge all clubs to set some time aside before playing activity recommences for 2023 to review and to discuss this section and to refer to it during the year as issues arise.**

Garda Vetting: Garda Vetting recognition has to be renewed every 3 years via the Foireann System. Remember your Club Children's Officer (CCO) is required to be provided with Club Administrator access to Foireann and then to vetting admin access in order to approve GV applications before they can be processed at National Level. Those who were vetted prior to or during 2020 will need to be re-vetted in 2023. Don't wait until validation expires to reapply. This process takes time particularly at busy times of the year. It's best to do so at the beginning of the year. All new coaches/mentors need to be garda vetted before they can commence working with underage players. Don't forget to get your Kelloggs Cúl Camp Coaches and Helpers vetted in a timely fashion

Safeguarding Training

Safeguarding1 (for all coaches/mentors) to be completed every three years. Clubs should contact the Safeguarding Tutors to arrange the SG1 course. I would like to thank our SG1 tutors for their work as tutors throughout the year. For details of tutors etc please contact me at childrensofficer.cork@gaa.ie

Safeguarding 2 (for Club & County Children's Officers)

Safeguarding 3 (for Club and County Designated Liaison Persons).

We will be relaunching SG2 & SG3 training early in the New Year once clubs have appointed their Children's Officers and Designated Liaison Persons.

Please note the following

- All Clubs must legally appoint both a Children's Officer and a Designated Liaison Person as well as 3 Person Code of Behaviour (Underage) Hearings Committee at the beginning of the Year. If a DLP isn't appointed the Club Chairperson automatically assumes the position of DLP.
- SG2 & SG3 training cannot be undertaken without first having completed

SG1 training

- Kelloggs Cúl Camp coaches and helpers need to complete SG1 training. Don't leave until the week before the camp. If helpers are not Garda Vetted and have not completed the SG1 training they must not be involved in your camp.

- The recommended tutor fee for SG1 training is €140

During the year all clubs completed the **Sports Ireland Safeguarding Self Assessment Audit 2022**. I would like to thank all clubs for their cooperation with this audit. There are number of matters arising from this audit.

- More than 1/3 of Clubs nationally had not appointed a 3 Person Independent Code of Behaviour Hearings committee. This could have serious implications in clubs where breaches of the Code of Behaviour occur. **You cannot form this committee after the complaint alleging a breach of the Code has been received. In Cork 56 clubs had no 3 Person Independent Code of Behaviour Hearings committee in 2022.** Let's sort that one out in 2023!

- In the Sports Ireland Audit Club Children's Officers were asked "What is the Main Issue of Alleged breaches of the Code of Behaviour (Underage) that has been brought to your attention"? In Cork 32% of Children's Officers reported that "Complaints by Parents over Lack of Playing Time for their Children" was the single greatest issue. This is a concerning figure. I would ask Clubs, their committees, coaching officers, development officers to seriously consider how we are catering for all of the children who come through our club gates. Player retention has to be central issue on club meeting agendas going forward.

Child Safety Risk Assessment and Child Safeguarding Statement 2023.

Key Points

- Mandatory under Children First and as per Code of Behaviour (Underage)
- No requirement for Independent, Amalgamated or Combined teams to complete. Parent Clubs only to complete
- Opens 1st March 2023. Deadline 31st March 2023.
- 1st April 2023 clubs not compliant and in breach of legislation will face closure for all underage activity.
- Webinars Saturday 11th & 25th of February 2023
- Completed Child Safety Statement must be displayed in a public place in your club.

The last **Child Safety Risk Assessment and Child Safeguarding Statement** was carried out in 2021. I would ask club executives to start preparing for the 2023 by ensuring that all under personnel are fully compliant with all legal requirement. Get your Garda Vetting up to date, organise Safeguarding 1 training for those who need it, ensure that all coaches have the required coaching qualifications, ensure that you are abiding by the correct ratio of coaches to players, that you are fully in compliance with the Code of Behaviour (Underage).

Cork Health & Wellbeing

I would like to thank the members of the County Health & Wellbeing Committee for their involvement in developing this initiative in the county. Most of our meetings to

date have been held virtually but the commitment, enthusiasm and knowledge of the committee is energising.

The highlight of our year was undoubtedly the launch of our positive mental poster **"Be Kind to your Mind"** by Labhrás Mac Cárthaigh Uachtarán Cumann Lúth Chleas Gael in Páirc Uí Chaoimh on April 21st. The poster features the contact details for 10 different support services – HSE Crisis Textline, Childline, Pieta House, HSE Drugs & Alcohol Helpline, Aware, Samaritans, Focus Ireland, Women's Aid, Men's Aid, and Simon Community. It was great to see the poster on display in a number of dressing rooms during the year. We intend to have another roll out of the poster with another initiative in 2023. We would like to thank Ted Owens of One Cork for his help in organising this event.

We are currently organising a Cork Health & Wellbeing Conference for Saturday March 4th 2023 in Páirc Uí Chaoimh. Our main topics will be "Bystander Intervention Programme" Dr Louise Crowley UCC & Bishopstown GAA, The Healthy Club Project and GAA for All. The topic of Well Being will feature our keynote speaker. Much more information will follow as the event is developed.

We are working with Terry Brady and Cian O'Brien to develop a Health & Wellbeing section in the Cork GAA Website. This section will feature Health & Wellbeing Resources and information which will be very useful to all clubs whether a recognised Healthy Club or not. We are also working with Cian to develop a series of Podcasts on the initiatives of the Healthy Clubs. We hope to be in a position to launch these podcasts in the New Year.

We are about to launch in early December a partnership with Cork Sports Partnership which will give GAA clubs access to the many programmes which Cork Sport Partnership organises.

Healthy Clubs Thirty three clubs are now fully involved in this initiative and are recognised as Healthy Clubs. The benefits to these clubs, their members and their communities are many and varied. These clubs are actively engaged with their communities and have succeeded in bringing their clubs out into the community and have brought the local community into their clubs. The main areas of involvement are Physical Activity, Healthy Eating, Community Development, Mental Fitness, Substance Use & Gambling, Diversity & Inclusion.

New applications for Phase 6 of the Healthy Club Project will open next Autumn.

Most clubs are already actively involved with their communities and are carrying regular worthwhile community activities. By registering for Phase 6 you will be supported in the community activities your club wishes to be involved in.
Action Plan for Clubs

- In the event of a tragic incident within your club or community how does your club respond? Croke Park will roll out training online on January 25th 2023 on helping clubs to formulate a **Critical Incident Response Plan**.
- I would ask all clubs to display their **Area Code** in a prominent place within their club grounds in the event of having to access the emergency services
- If your club has a Defibrillator please have it checked regularly to ensure that it is in perfect working order. Make sure it is easily accessible in case it is needed. Ensure

that you have a number of people trained in using the Defibrillator and those trained complete refresher training when their original training certification expires. If your club hasn't a Defibrillator perhaps it is time that you considered investing in one. These machines save lives regularly.

- **Reminder a Post Christmas Initiative : 'IRELAND LIGHTS UP'** – Ireland's biggest Community Walking Initiative – returns to GAA Clubs in January 2023 in partnership with RTE's Operation Transformation and the support of Get Ireland Walking.

This initiative encourages GAA clubs across the 32 counties to light up their walking tracks and bring communities together to walk and talk in a safe environment during the dark winter evenings. As ever, a club participating in **Ireland Lights Up** will be selected each week to feature on RTE's Operation Transformation. In 2022, a record 700 GAA clubs signed up for Ireland Lights Up helping tens of thousands of participants to get more physically active. Clubs also recruited over 28,000 walkers to participate in the **'Irish Life Every Steps Counts Challenge'** delivered through the **'MyLife'** app, in partnership with the **Irish Life GAA Healthy Clubs** programme. Participants walked over 5,000,000 kms during the five-week challenge. Once again, three clubs from each province will win gear vouchers worth a total of €5,000, kindly provided by Irish Life (T&Cs apply). Registrations for the 2023 'Ireland Lights Up' and 'Every Step Counts' MyLife Challenge open now. Both activities commence on Wednesday, January 11th, to coincide with the broadcast of the second episode of Operation Transformation on RTE.

Coaching Officer Report 2022

Diarmaid Breatnach,



Coaching and games have had a very busy year once again and below is a synopsis of the key initiatives being delivered

DEVELOPMENT SQUADS

The year started with a Cork GAA Coach Development Program for development squad mentors. This education series ran over 6 nights in both hurling and football. Coaches were treated to a mix of practical and theoretical approaches based around the Principles of Attack and Defense using a games based approach to designing sessions. Coaches also profiled the habits of highly effective coaches and the effectiveness of the Program was analysed by MTU Cork via a Masters student. This education model is being considered for roll out at national level for performance coaches as a result of this pilot. On the field, Cork GAA had a huge volume of activity for players with 10 teams competing in u14 inter regional game days in each code. The u15s had 4 teams in each code competing in an inter county league from April to August. At u16 level, there was 2 teams in each code. Our teams were lucky to have excellent coaching structures in place and players benefited hugely from the sessions and matches. The development squads program was enhanced greatly by the advancement of the athletic development education moving to resistance-based programs for the u15s & u16s since early November under the direction of Aidan O Connell, High Performance Manager and running throughout the year rather than for just a block of time in the Winter period. This will ensure that players are more robust and better equipped to match other counties from an athletic perspective in the years ahead. The work going on at development

squads level in incredible and there is a lot of people (80 mentors) putting in a lot of time to ensuring the next generation of players are given the best possible start in their careers. Thanks also to the clubs who cooperate with the squad managers to ensure players are not over worked and school teachers who do tremendous work with players during the school term.

CUL CAMPS

Our Cúl Camps continue to go from strength in the post Covid era. There were 110 camp venues across Cork (the largest in Ireland) and over 15,000 children participating in a week full of fun, hurling and football. There is enormous credit due to the coordinators in clubs who put so much work in to preparing for the camps and then ensuring that everything runs smoothly through the week of the camp. Our GDA's also do enormous work in helping source coaches and provide assistance to coordinators and coaches on the ground.

SCHOOLS INITIATIVES

The Autumn saw GDA's launch two new initiatives. At Primary School level, a county wide blitz program commenced in all areas of the county. The idea is to provide a fun and inclusive opportunity for all schools and class groups to participate in a local blitz in both hurling and football during the academic year. Thus far, numbers have been very encouraging, and the feedback has been very positive from all involved. At Post Primary level, GDA's have coordinated an u14 competition for all schools. Regional blitz style grading days were used to get schools out and the next rounds then ensured schools were matched up at their

level in the more competitive fixtures. Our GDAs have been very proactive in getting feedback from teachers and putting together this program which provides a template for the future of u14 schools competitions.

MUNSTER CLUB DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

The Munster GAA Club Development Program was designed by Munster Games Development to help assist clubs plan strategically. The aim is that every club in Munster would use this facilitation process to put firm plans in place over the next 2-3 years. The program consists of consultation with club members and focus groups to develop medium to long term plans in areas such as games development, finance/fundraising, recruitment and retention of volunteers. For clubs to avail of this program, they should e mail coachingofficer.cork@gaa.ie for further

details or by contacting their local GDA.

In conclusion, I wish to thank my fellow officers on the Executive, Bord na nÓg, and all Cork GAA members, for your help and support. I want to acknowledge the wonderful work of our GDAs and all our coaches and helpers throughout the year. We should soon be in a position to greatly enhance the promotion and development of our game throughout Cork as a result of the new Croke Park led funding model 2023-2026. A special word of gratitude to Kevin O Callaghan, who recently vacated his position as Games Manager for his dedicated and inspirational work for Cork GAA over the last 12 years. I wish him well in his new role as GAA Development Officer in MTU Cork.

Report on the audit of the financial statements

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of The Gaelic Athletic Association Cork County Board ("the Board") for the year ended 30 September 2022, which comprise the Board's Revenue Account, the Grounds' Revenue Account, the Cork GAA Members' Draw Account, the Statement of Financial Position, and the related notes 1 to 11, including a summary of significant accounting policies. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is a special purpose framework comprising the financial reporting provisions of the accounting policies of the Gaelic Athletic Association Cork County Board's ('the Board') set on pages 9 to 12 to these financial statements.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements of the Board for the year ended 30 September 2022 are prepared, in all material respects, in accordance with the requirement to present financial statements to Cork County Committee Convention.

Basis for opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (Ireland) (ISAs (Ireland)). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Board in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Ireland, including the Ethical Standard issued by the Irish Audit and Accounting Supervisory Authority (IAASA), and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements.

The financial statements are prepared to assist the Board in complying with the requirement to present financial statements to Cork County Committee Convention. As a result, the financial statements may not be suitable for another purpose. Our report is intended solely for the Board and for Cork County Committee Convention, in accordance with our engagement letter, and should not be distributed to or used by parties other than the Board. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

Conclusions relating to going concern

In auditing the financial statements, we have concluded that the Executive Committee's use of the going concern basis of accounting in the preparation of the financial statements is appropriate.

Based on the work we have performed, we have not identified any material uncertainties relating to events or conditions that, individually or collectively, may cast significant doubt on the Board's ability to continue as a going concern for a period of at least twelve months from the date when the financial statements are authorised for issue. However, because not all future events or conditions can be predicted, this statement is not a guarantee as to the Board's ability to continue as a going concern.





NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

30 September 2022

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The significant accounting policies adopted by the Board in the preparation of these financial statements are as follows:

(a) *Going concern and basis of preparation*

The financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis.

The re-development of Pairc Ui Chaoimh stadium was substantially completed in 2017, came into operational use during 2018 and certain final accounts are still in the process of being agreed with parties in relation to the project.

The Board set up two special purpose companies, Pairc Ui Chaoimh CTR ('PUC') and Staid Cois Laoi CTR ('SCL') to manage the administration, management, promotion, commercial opportunities, the facilitation of club and inter-county games and on-going maintenance of Pairc Ui Chaoimh Stadium. The operations and results of these companies are reported separately in their own financial statements. On 1 October 2021 the trade, assets, and liabilities of Staid Cois Laoi CTR were transferred to Pairc Ui Chaoimh CTR. Staid Cois Laoi CTR is a related entity by virtue of common directors and officers. Staid Cois Laoi CTR has ceased trading and the Directors intend to voluntarily strike off the company.

The stadium re-development has been financed to date by the Board's own finances, a grant of €20.0 million from Central Council, State and other grants of €33.75 million, bank loans and sales under long term tickets and other fundraising schemes. In prior years, certain costs relating to the stadium companies and the re-development costs have also been met directly by Pairc an Chrocaigh CTR, a Croke Park company.

The stadium asset and cost of the re-developed Pairc Ui Chaoimh stadium have been recorded to date in Cork County Board ('CCB'), which is the ultimate controlling party of the two stadium companies. It is being considered by the Executive Committee of CCB to transfer the stadium asset and stadium costs including the related capital grants, amounts owed to Pairc an Chrocaigh CTR (refer Note 9), the remaining capital accruals and bank loans to Pairc Ui Chaoimh CTR. This will ensure the stadium asset and related activities will be recorded in the same entity going forward.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

(a) *Going concern and basis of preparation (contained)*

The Executive Committee have performed a going concern assessment, incorporating the overall finances and cashflows of Cork GAA that incorporate CCB and PUC which include future activities, committed, and expected funding for a period of 15 months from the date of approval of the financial statements. In preparing these cashflows, the bank debt stands at €21,056,000 at the end of September 2022 and the underlying bank facilities were updated in September 2021 to extend the facility through to 2028 with annual repayments of €750,000 to €1,100,000. The bank loan facility will be revisited with our lenders in 2028. The Board has and continues to be reliant on the financial support from Pairc an Chrocaigh CTR. This has also been extended into a longer term loan facility with Cork GAA in 2021 with annual capital repayments of €500,000 per annum.

The main assumptions around the going concern assessment comprise the timing and receipt of revenue from certain of Cork GAA's various income streams in 2022/23.

Nevertheless, after preparing the cash flow projections and the directors' belief that additional funding will be forthcoming as required, the directors have a reasonable expectation that Cork GAA and the company will have adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Taking these factors into consideration the directors have concluded that it is appropriate to continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

Historical cost convention

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention.

The financial statements are presented in euro ("€") which is the presentational currency of these financial statements and all values are rounded to the nearest euro unit except where otherwise indicated.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

(a) *Long term investments*

Long term investments in unlisted shares are carried at cost.

(b) *Income and expenditure*

Income and expenditure are accounted for on an accruals basis.

Interest on long term investments is recognised in the period it is accrued and adjustments in value from cost to maturity value are debited to financial income.

Income from Championship games played within the financial period (30 September) is accrued for in the accounts. Any games played after the financial period end are excluded.

The Executive Committee's policy is to account for gross sponsorship income received in connection with its activities. In the Board's Revenue Account, all such income is included in either Commercial or Transfer income and the related disbursements are included in the appropriate category of expenditure. Consistent with this policy, sponsored gear and equipment is included, at cost, in Commercial Income and in Inter County Teams' Expenses.

(c) *Cork GAA members' draw*

The Cork GAA members' draw year ends on 31 December and the policy of the Executive Committee is to include, in its income, the results of the draws which were completed within its financial period. Monies received in the Board's financial period, which relate to the October – December period of the 2022 draw, are treated as deferred income and are included as liabilities in the Board's Statement of Financial Position. Expenditure, including prizes, is matched with related income.

(d) *Capital grants*

Government, Central and Munster Council grants in relation to the re-development of Pairc Uí Chaoimh are credited to a deferred capital grant account and are released to income and expenditure account over the expected useful lives of the relevant assets by equal annual instalments which commenced in the current period.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

(e) *Capital grants (continued)*

Non-repayable Central and Munster Council grants and grants from the government towards the cost of Pairc Ui Rinn and other grounds are credited to a deferred capital grants account and shown separately in the Statement of Financial Position and are not therefore credited to income.

(f) *Fixed assets and depreciation*

Direct costs include personnel, administration and finance costs directly related to the construction of the asset and were capitalised to 31 October 2017. Thereafter, these costs are expensed as the stadium is now complete.

The re-development costs of Pairc Ui Chaoimh are included in the grounds account of Pairc Ui Chaoimh. The stadium is being depreciated but it is being considered to transfer the stadium to Pairc Ui Chaoimh CTR at depreciated cost post period end. Lands included in grounds are not depreciated.

Depreciation is provided on all fixed assets, except as noted below, at rates calculated to write off the costs less estimated residual value, of each asset systematically over its expected useful life, on a straight-line basis, as follows:

Pairc Ui Chaoimh	-	2.5%
Fixtures and equipment	-	5% - 10%
Computer equipment and software	-	20%

The Board's other grounds, including Pairc Ui Rinn, are currently not depreciated. It is the Board's practice to maintain the grounds/stadia in proper operating condition by regular maintenance and upgrading as required. Accordingly, the Board considers that the lives of the grounds/stadia are so long and residual value so high that any depreciation is immaterial.

Fixed assets are reviewed for impairment on an annual basis.

(g) *Cash and cash equivalents*

Cash and cash equivalents in the Statement of Financial Position comprise cash at banks and in hand and short-term deposits with an original maturity date of three months or less.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
30 September 2022 (Continued)

2. JUDGEMENTS AND KEY SOURCES OF ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY

The preparation of financial statements requires the Executive Committee to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported for assets and liabilities as at the Statement of Financial Position date and the amounts reported for revenues and expenses during the period. However, the nature of estimation means that actual outcomes could differ from those estimates.

The following judgements (apart from those involving estimates) have had the most significant effect on amounts recognised in the financial statements:

Amounts capitalised in respect of Pairc Ui Chaoimh re-development

In determining the amounts to be capitalised in respect of Pairc Ui Chaoimh re-development at period end, the Board has used judgement in identifying the period over which construction and other direct costs should be capitalised.

Whilst the stadium is complete, certain final construction and other costs in relation to the stadium are still being finalised with parties in relation to the re-development along with the recovery of certain costs from other parties. The Executive Committee has exercised judgement and estimated the final amounts to be paid or recovered at the Statement of Financial Position date. Changes to these estimates could ultimately result in the Board paying or receiving more or less on the amounts currently accounted for in the financial statements which would result in a change to the overall project costs and the amounts capitalised as fixed assets.

Useful lives of fixed assets

Fixed assets comprising primarily grounds and fixtures and equipment represent a significant portion of total assets. The annual depreciation charge depends primarily on the estimated lives of each type of asset and, in certain circumstances, estimates of residual values. Management regularly review these useful lives and change them if necessary to reflect current conditions. In determining these useful lives management consider technological change, patterns of consumption, physical condition and expected economic utilisation of the assets. Changes in the useful lives can have a significant impact on the depreciation charge for the financial period. See Note 3 for the carrying amount of fixed assets.

In 2017, the Board drew down bank financing from Bank of Ireland in connection with the re-development of Pairc Ui Chaoimh stadium. The loan facilities were re-negotiated during the prior year and were converted into a term loan facility of €9,342,000 to 2023 and the balance comprised of loan facilities due within the next year.

The bank facilities were updated in September 2021 to extend the facility through to 2028 with annual repayments of €750,000 to €1,100,000 over that period with the remaining loan to be revisited with our lenders in 2028. Repayments on this revised bank loan facility re-commenced in September 2021 in line with the agreement.

The bank loans would be transferred to Pairc Ui Chaoimh CTR if the stadium is to be transferred from the Cork County Board.

The bank loans are secured on the assets of Cork County Board and Pairc an Chrocaigh CTR are co-guarantors to the loan agreement.

8. CAPITAL COMMITMENTS

There were no significant capital commitments contracted for at the Statement of Financial Position date.

9. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Cork County Board transacts with Central Council and Munster Council and with its member Clubs and Divisions. These transactions are reflected in the underlying records and are in the normal course of business.

The Board has and continues to be reliant on the financial support from a related entity, Pairc an Chrocaigh CTR, and balances have been extended into a longer term loan facility with Cork GAA in 2021 with annual capital repayments of €500,000 per annum. The Board owes monies of €7,763,722 (period ended 30 September 2021: €7,928,810) to Pairc an Chrocaigh CTR at 30 September 2021 which primarily relates to the stadium build of which €500,000 (period ended 30 September 2021: €500,000) is included in Creditors less than one year and the balance of €7,263,722 (period ended 30 September 2021: €7,428,810) is included in Creditors greater than one year.

The Board set up two companies, Staid Cois Laoi CTR and Pairc Ui Chaoimh CTR in 2017, which deal with commercial and sporting activities of the re-developed stadium. On 1 October 2021 the trade, assets, and liabilities of a related party Staid Cois Laoi CTR were transferred to Pairc Ui Chaoimh CTR. Staid Cois Laoi CTR is a related entity by virtue of common directors and officers.

As noted in the grounds' revenue account, costs of €1,955,844 (period ended 30 September 2021: €1,507,106) relating to the Pairc Ui Chaoimh stadium has been recharged to these companies for the year ended 30 September 2022. An amount of €2,671,987 (period ended 30 September 2021: receivable of €Nil) is receivable from Pairc Ui Chaoimh CTR and is included in Debtors at 30 September 2022.

Key management personnel

All directors and senior employees who have authority and responsibility for planning, directing, and controlling the activities of the entity are considered to be key management personnel. No remuneration is paid to directors. Total remuneration for senior employees including pension contributions paid by the three entities of Cork GAA in respect of these personnel amounted to €319,310 (Period ended 30 September 2021: €233,449).

There are no significant events affecting the Cork County Board since the year end.

DIRECTORS' REPORT **for the year ended 30 September 2022**

The directors present their report and financial statements for the year ended 30 September 2022.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The principal activity of the company consists of the administration, management, promotion and facilitation of club and inter-county games and on-going maintenance of Pairc Ui Chaoimh Stadium.

BUSINESS REVIEW

The re-development of Pairc Ui Chaoimh was completed and came into operational use in July 2017. On 1 October 2021 the trade, assets, and liabilities of a related party Staid Cois Laoi CTR were transferred to Pairc Ui Chaoimh CTR. Staid Cois Laoi CTR is a related entity by virtue of common directors and officers. The transfer resulted in a write off of the intercompany balance with Staid Cois Laoi CTR, in the amount of €2,299,873, in the Statement of Comprehensive Income. The financial statements of Staid Cois Laoi CTR disclose a corresponding gain in the Statement of Comprehensive Income. Staid Cois Laoi CTR has ceased trading and the Directors intend to voluntarily strike off the company.

During the year, the company also bore the depreciation costs of €1,461,700 (period ended 30 September 2021: €1,116,619) and bank and other loan interest costs of €780,341 (period ended 30 September 2021: €627,138) relating to the re-developed Pairc Ui Chaoimh stadium.

The Statement of Comprehensive Income and Statement of Financial Position for the year ended 30 September 2022 are set out on pages 12 and 14. Loss before taxation amounted to €3,266,384 (period ended 30 September 2021: loss €1,908,356). After deducting taxation of Nil a loss of €3,266,384 (period ended 30 September 2021: loss €1,908,356) has been taken to reserves.

The key performance indicators for the company are revenue, profit before tax and EBITDA (Earnings before interest, tax, depreciation, and amortisation).

BUSINESS REVIEW (Continued)

The company's EBITDA amounted to €1,275,530 when depreciation of €1,461,700 (including stadium depreciation recharged from Cork County Board of €1,235,894), net interest of €780,341 and write off of intercompany balance with SCL of €2,299,873 are added back to loss before tax.

PRINCIPAL RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The principal risks and uncertainties facing the company are broadly grouped as – operational, competitive, economic, legislative, financial instrument risk and exposure to liquidity and cash flow risk

Operational risk

Operational risk is the risk of direct or indirect losses due to inadequacy or failure of internal processes, people, or systems.

Competitive risks

Loss of revenue, customers and key staff are the main risks that could affect the company's financial position.

Economic risk

Economic risk is the risk of direct or indirect losses due to external events. The risk has been minimised by continuous monitoring of the market and competitors, adequate insurance cover and regular management review of the business.

The company has insurances and structures to limit these risks and the board of directors regularly review, reassess, and proactively limit the associated risks.

Legislative risks

The company operates within a legal framework and consequently faces a requirement to ensure compliance with legal and regulatory requirements.

Financial instrument risks

The company's primary objectives are to protect the company from events that hinder the achievement of the company's performance objectives. These objectives aim to limit undue counterparty exposure, ensure sufficient working capital exists and monitor the management of risk at business unit level.

DIRECTORS' REPORT
for the year ended 30 September 2022 (Continued)

PRINCIPAL RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES (Continued)

Exposure to liquidity and cash flow risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that an entity will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities. The company aims to mitigate liquidity risk by managing cash generation from its operations and applying cash collection targets throughout the company. The company also manages liquidity risk through a combination of credit facilities and support from Pairc an Chrocaigh CTR.

Cash flow risk is the risk of exposure to variability in cash flows. The company manages this risk as explained re liquidity risk above.

The directors believe that the key personnel and operating procedures are in place to mitigate the risks and uncertainties' above.

FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

Details of the financial risk management objectives and policies and the exposure of the company to liquidity risk and cash flow risk are provided under 'Principal Risks and uncertainties' above.

EVENTS SINCE THE STATEMENT OF FINANCIAL POSITION DATE

There were no significant events affecting the company after the Statement of Financial Position date.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS IN THE BUSINESS

The directors plan to maximise the rental of the stadium and all-weather pitch for both match days and other events in the foreseeable future.

As at 30 September 2022, the stadium costs including the related capital grants, remaining capital accruals and bank loans are accounted for in the Cork County Board financial statements, which will be presented before annual convention in December 2022. It is being considered by the Executive of Cork County Board, the Directors of Pairc Ui Chaoimh CTR and the Management Committee of Central Council to transfer the stadium asset and stadium costs including the related capital grants, amounts owed to Pairc an Chrocaigh CTR, the remaining capital accruals and bank loans to Pairc Ui Chaoimh CTR. The remaining stadium capital costs will then be discharged directly by the company with financial support from Pairc an Chrocaigh CTR. On 9 November 2022, Pairc Ui Chaoimh CTR was granted Sporting Exemption status by the Revenue Commissioners in accordance with section 235 of the Taxes Consolidation Act 1997.

DIRECTORS' AND SECRETARY'S INTERESTS IN SHARES

The company is a company limited by guarantee and does not have a share capital. Therefore, the directors and secretary who served during the period did not have a beneficial interest in the company.

GOING CONCERN

The company's business activities, together with the factors likely to affect its future development, its financial position and financial risk management objectives are described above in the Directors' Report.

The financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis, the directors have a reasonable expectation that the company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Accordingly, they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis, in preparing the financial statements, can be found in the Accounting Policies (Note 1).

ACCOUNTING RECORDS

The measures that the directors have taken to secure compliance with the requirements of sections 281 to 285 of the Companies Act 2014 with regard to the keeping of accounting records are the employment of appropriately qualified accounting personnel and the maintenance of computerised accounting systems. 



Opinion





NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

30 September 2022

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) *Statement of compliance*

Pairc Ui Chaoimh CTR is a company limited by guarantee incorporated on 5 September 2017 in the Republic of Ireland. The registered office is Páirc Ui Chaoimh, Ballintemple, Cork, which is also the principal place of business of the company. The nature of the company's operations and its principal activities are set out in the Directors' Report.

The company's financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards issued by the Financial Reporting Council, including FRS 102 The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (Generally Accepted Accounting Practice in Ireland).

(b) *Basis of preparation*

The statutory financial statements are prepared in euro which is the presentational and functional currency of the company. In accordance with FRS 102, the directors have reviewed the company's accounting policies and consider these appropriate for the company.

The current accounting period being reported commenced on 1 October 2021 and ended on 30 September 2022. The prior accounting period commenced on 1 November 2020 and ended on 30 September 2021.

Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis, notwithstanding the loss incurred for the year, the net liabilities as outlined in the Statement of Financial Position and the legacy impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on the financial position of the company.

The stadium asset and cost of the re-developed Pairc Ui Chaoimh stadium have been recorded to date in Cork County Board ('CCB'), an entity separate to the two stadium companies and which is their ultimate controlling party. It is being considered by the Executive Committee of CCB to transfer the stadium asset and stadium costs including the related capital grants, remaining capital accruals and bank loans to Pairc Ui Chaoimh CTR. This will ensure the stadium asset and related activities will be recorded in the same entity going forward

The stadium re-development has been financed to date by the Board's own finances, a grant of €20 million from Central Council, State and other grants of €33.75 million, bank loans and sales under long term tickets and other fundraising schemes. In prior years, certain costs relating to the stadium companies and the re-development costs have also been met directly by Pairc an Chrocaigh CTR, a Croke Park company.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
30 September 2022 (Continued)

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

(b) *Basis of preparation (continued)*

Going concern (continued)

The company's liabilities exceeded its total assets by €8,644,044 for the year ended 30 September 2022. The company was supported by cashflows from the Cork County Board during 2022 and funding continues to be in place through Pairc an Chrocaigh CTR which was provided in prior years.

The Directors have performed a going concern assessment, incorporating the overall finances and cashflows of Cork GAA that incorporate both trading entities which include future activities, committed and expected funding for a period of 15 months from the date of approval of the financial statements. In preparing these cashflows, the bank debt stands at €21,056,000 at the end of September 2022 (which sits in the accounts of Cork County Board) and the underlying bank facilities were updated in September 2021 to extend the facility through to 2028 with annual repayments of €750,000 to €1,100,000. The bank loan facility will be revisited with our lenders in 2028. The company has and continues to be reliant on the financial support from Pairc an Chrocaigh CTR. This facility was extended into a longer term loan facility with Cork GAA in 2021 with annual capital repayments of €500,000 per annum. Pairc an Chrocaigh CTR has confirmed that this financial support will continue for a period of at least 12 months from the date of approval of the financial statements.

The main assumptions around the going concern assessment comprise the timing and receipt of revenue from certain of Cork GAA's various income streams in 2022/23.

Nevertheless, after preparing the cash flow projections the directors' belief that additional funding will be forthcoming as required, the directors have a reasonable expectation that Cork GAA and the company will have adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Taking these factors into consideration the directors have concluded that it is appropriate to continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
30 September 2022 (Continued)

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

(c) *Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty*

The preparation of the statutory financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported for assets and liabilities as at the Statement of Financial Position date and the amounts reported for revenues and expenses during the period. However, the nature of estimation means that actual outcomes could differ from those estimates. The following is the company's key source of estimation uncertainty:

(i) *Useful lives of property plant and equipment*

Long-lived assets comprising primarily of property, plant and equipment represent a significant portion of total assets. The annual depreciation charge depends primarily on the estimated lives of each type of asset and, in certain circumstances, estimates of residual values. The directors regularly review these useful lives and change them if necessary, to reflect current conditions. In determining these useful lives management consider technological change, patterns of consumption, physical condition and expected economic utilisation of the assets. Changes in the useful lives can have a significant impact on the depreciation charge for the financial period. The net book value of tangible assets subject to depreciation at the financial period end date was €1,357,272 (period ended 30 September 2021: €371,808).

(d) *Deferred term ticket revenue and corporate facilities*

Advance sales of term tickets and corporate packages for the stadium redevelopment programme are initially recognised in the Statement of Financial Position as deferred revenue.

Revenue from corporate facilities is credited to the Statement of Comprehensive Income in equal annual instalments over the term of the packages.

(e) *Revenue recognition*

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and represents the amount receivable for goods supplied or services rendered and rental income net of discounts or transaction costs allowed by the Company and net of value added taxes.

Rental income is recognised on an accruals basis and recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income in line with underlying contracts.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
30 September 2022 (Continued)

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

(f) *Basic financial instruments*

An entity shall recognise a financial asset or financial liability only when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

(i) *Trade and other debtors/creditors*

Trade and other debtors are recognised initially at transactions price less attributable transaction costs. Subsequent to initial recognition they are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment losses in the case of trade debtors. If the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, for example, if payment is deferred beyond normal business terms, then it is measured at the present value of future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

(ii) *Cash and cash equivalents*

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash balances and call deposits. Bank overdrafts that are repayable on demand and form an integral part of the company's cash management are included as a component of cash and cash equivalents.

(g) *Foreign currencies*

Transactions denominated in foreign currencies relating to revenues, costs and non-monetary assets are translated into euro at the rates of exchange ruling on the dates on which the transactions occurred.

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into euro at the rates of exchange ruling at the Statement of Financial Position date. The resulting profits or losses are dealt with in the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

(h) *Tangible fixed assets and depreciation*

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost or valuation less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses. Cost includes costs directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets, at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value, of each asset systematically over its expected useful life, on a straight-line basis, as follows:

Land and buildings	-	4% - 10%
Fixtures, fittings, and equipment	-	10%

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

(i) *Impairments of assets, other than financial instruments*

Where there is objective evidence that recoverable amounts of an asset are less than its carrying value, the carrying amount of the asset is reduced to its recoverable amount resulting in an impairment loss. Impairment losses are recognised immediately in the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

Where the circumstances causing an impairment of an asset no longer apply, then the impairment is reversed through the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

The recoverable amount of property, plant and equipment is the higher of the fair value less costs to sell the asset and its value in use. The value in use of these assets is the present value of the cash flows expected to be derived from those assets. This is determined by reference to the present value of the future cash flows of the company which is considered by the directors to be a single cash generating unit.

(j) *Leasing and hire purchase commitments*

Assets held under finance leases and hire purchase contracts are recognised in the Statement of Financial Position and are depreciated over their useful lives with the corresponding lease or hire purchase obligation being recognised as a liability. The interest element of the finance lease rentals is charged to the Statement of Comprehensive Income over the period of the lease and represent a constant periodic rate of interest on the balance of capital repayments outstanding.

Operating lease rentals are charged to the Statement of Comprehensive Income on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

(k) *Taxation*

Corporation tax is provided on taxable profits of the period. Current tax is determined using tax rates (and laws) that have been enacted or substantially enacted by the Statement of Financial Position date.

Deferred tax is recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated but not reversed at Statement of Financial Position date, where transactions or events that result in an obligation to discharge a tax liability or receive a benefit in the future have occurred at the Statement of Financial Position date, with the exception of deferred tax assets.

Deferred tax assets are recognised only to the extent that the directors consider that it is more likely than not that there will be suitable taxable profits from which the future reversal of the underlying timing differences can be deducted.

Deferred tax is measured on a non-discounted basis at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the year in which the differences reverse based on tax rates and laws enacted or substantively enacted at the Statement of Financial Position date.

In the current year, interest of €209,912 (period ended 30 September 2021: €188,786) was charged in full to this company at a rate of 1.9% on amounts advanced to the stadium companies by Pairc an Chrocaigh CTR in relation to amounts advanced to fund the Pairc Ui Chaoimh stadium.

The ultimate controlling party of the company is Cork County Board.

DIRECTORS' REPORT for the year ended 30 September 2022

The directors present their first report and financial statements for the year ended 30 September 2022.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The principal activity of the company previously consisted of the administration and management of commercial opportunities of Pairc Ui Chaoimh Stadium. The company is now dormant.

BUSINESS REVIEW

The company commenced trading with the opening of the redeveloped stadium in July 2017. On 1 October 2021 the trade, assets, and liabilities of Staid Cois Laoi CTR were transferred to a related party, Pairc Ui Chaoimh CTR, an entity related by virtue of common directors and officers. There was a gain on the write back of the intercompany balance with Pairc Ui Chaoimh CTR of €2,299,873 as a result of this transfer. The financial statements of Pairc Ui Chaoimh CTR disclose a corresponding expense in the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

The Statement of Comprehensive Income and Statement of Financial Position for the year ended 30 September 2022 are set out on pages 9 and 11. Profit before taxation amounted to €2,296,873 (period ended 30 September 2021: Loss €560,448). After deducting taxation of Nil a profit of €2,296,873 (period ended 30 September 2021: Loss €560,448) has been taken to reserves.

PRINCIPAL RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

Under Irish company law, the company is required to give a description of the principal risks and uncertainties faced. The Company has ceased trading and the Directors intend to voluntarily strike off the Company. There are no significant risks faced by the Company.

EVENTS SINCE THE STATEMENT OF FINANCIAL POSITION DATE

There were no significant events affecting the Company after the Statement of Financial Position date.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

The Directors intend to voluntarily strike off the company in 2023.

No political donations were made by the Company during the period, which require disclosure in accordance with the Electoral Acts 1997 to 2012.





NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
30 September 2022

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) *Statement of compliance*

Staid Cois Laoi CTR is a company limited by guarantee incorporated on 8 June 2017 in the Republic of Ireland. The registered office is Páirc Ui Chaoimh, Ballintemple, Cork, which is also the principal place of business of the company. The nature of the company's operations and its principal activities are set out in the Directors' Report.

The company's financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards issued by the Financial Reporting Council, including FRS 102 The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (Generally Accepted Accounting Practice in Ireland).

(b) *Basis of preparation going concern*

The statutory financial statements are prepared in euro which is the presentational and functional currency of the company.

In accordance with FRS 102, the directors have reviewed the company's accounting policies and consider these appropriate for the company.

The current accounting period being reported commenced on 1 October 2021 and ended on 30 September 2022. The prior accounting period commenced on 1 November 2020 and ended on 30 September 2021.

On 1 October 2021 the trade, assets, and liabilities of Staid Cois Laoi CTR were transferred to a related party, Páirc Ui Chaoimh CTR, an entity related by virtue of common directors and officers. There was a gain on the write back of the intercompany balance with Páirc Ui Chaoimh CTR of €2,299,873 as a result of this transfer. The financial statements of Páirc Ui Chaoimh CTR discloses a corresponding expense in the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

The Directors intend to voluntarily strike off the Company, and therefore the company do not consider it to be appropriate to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements. Accordingly, the financial statements have been prepared on a basis other than going concern where all assets are stated at their net recoverable amounts, all further liabilities which may arise have been provided for, and all non-current assets and liabilities have been classified as current, in accordance with the Companies Act 2014.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
30 September 2022 (Continued)

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

(c) *Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty*

The preparation of the statutory financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported for assets and liabilities as at the Statement of Financial Position date and the amounts reported for revenues and expenses during the year. However, the nature of estimation means that actual outcomes could differ from those estimates. The following is the company's key source of estimation uncertainty:

(i) *Useful lives of property plant and equipment*

Long-lived assets comprising primarily of property, plant and equipment represent a significant portion of total assets. The annual depreciation charge depends primarily on the estimated lives of each type of asset and, in certain circumstances, estimates of residual values. The directors regularly review these useful lives and change them if necessary, to reflect current conditions. In determining these useful lives management consider technological change, patterns of consumption, physical condition and expected economic utilisation of the assets. Changes in the useful lives can have a significant impact on the depreciation charge for the financial year. The net book value of tangible assets subject to depreciation at the financial year end date was Nil (period ended 30 September 2021: €1,163,210).

(d) *Deferred revenue and corporate facilities*

Advance sales of rights and corporate packages for the stadium redevelopment programme are initially recognised in the Statement of Financial Position as deferred revenue.

Revenue from corporate facilities is credited to the Statement of Comprehensive Income in equal annual instalments over the term of the agreements.

(e) *Revenue recognition*

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and represents the amount receivable for goods supplied or services rendered and rental income net of discounts or transaction costs allowed by the Company and net of value added taxes.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
30 September 2022 (Continued)

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

(e) *Revenue recognition (continued)*

Rental income is recognised on an accruals basis and recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income in line with underlying contracts.

(f) *Basic financial instruments*

An entity shall recognise a financial asset or financial liability only when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

(i) *Trade and other debtors/creditors*

Trade and other debtors are recognised initially at transaction price less attributable transaction costs. Subsequent to initial recognition they are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment losses in the case of trade debtors. If the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, for example, if payment is deferred beyond normal business terms, then it is measured at the present value of future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

(ii) *Cash and cash equivalents*

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash balances and call deposits. Bank overdrafts that are repayable on demand and form an integral part of the company's cash management are included as a component of cash and cash equivalents.

(g) *Foreign currencies*

Transactions denominated in foreign currencies relating to revenues, costs and non-monetary assets are translated into euro at the rates of exchange ruling on the dates on which the transactions occurred.

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into euro at the rates of exchange ruling at the Statement of Financial Position date. The resulting profits or losses are dealt with in the Income Statement.

(h) *Tangible fixed assets and depreciation*

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost or valuation less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses. Cost includes costs directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets, at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value, of each asset systematically over its expected useful life, on a straight-line basis, as follows:

Technology and other equipment	-	10%
Bar and catering equipment	-	10%

(i) *Impairments of assets, other than financial instruments*

Where there is objective evidence that recoverable amounts of an asset are less than its carrying value the carrying amount of the asset is reduced to its recoverable amount resulting in an impairment loss. Impairment losses are recognised immediately in the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

Where the circumstances causing an impairment of an asset no longer apply, then the impairment is reversed through the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

The recoverable amount of property, plant and equipment is the higher of the fair value less costs to sell the asset and its value in use. The value in use of these assets is the present value of the cash flows expected to be derived from those assets. This is determined by reference to the present value of the future cash flows of the company which is considered by the directors to be a single cash generating unit.

(j) *Leasing and hire purchase commitments*

Assets held under finance leases and hire purchase contracts are recognised in the Statement of Financial Position and are depreciated over their useful lives with the corresponding lease or hire purchase obligation being recognised as a liability. The interest element of the finance lease rentals is charged to the Statement of Comprehensive Income over the period of the lease and represent a constant periodic rate of interest on the balance of capital repayments outstanding.

Operating lease rentals are charged to the Statement of Comprehensive Income on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

(k) *Taxation*

Corporation tax is provided on taxable profits of the year. Current tax is determined using tax rates (and laws) that have been enacted or substantially enacted by the Statement of Financial Position date.

Deferred tax is recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated but not reversed at Statement of Financial Position date, where transactions or events that result in an obligation to discharge a tax liability or receive a benefit in the future have occurred at the Statement of Financial Position date, with the exception of deferred tax assets.

Deferred tax assets are recognised only to the extent that the directors consider that it is more likely than not that there will be suitable taxable profits from which the future reversal of the underlying timing differences can be deducted.

Deferred tax is measured on a non-discounted basis at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the year in which the differences reverse based on tax rates and laws enacted or substantively enacted at the Statement of Financial Position date.

Amounts owed to related companies represents a balance due to Pairc an Chrocaigh CTR, as part of a wider loan facility provided to Cork GAA, which carries interest at a rate of 1.9% per annum and is repayable annual by instalments.

On 1 October 2021 the trade, assets, and liabilities of Staid Cois Laoi CTR were transferred to a related party, Pairc Ui Chaoimh CTR, an entity related by virtue of common directors and officers. There was a gain on the write back of the intercompany balance with Pairc Ui Chaoimh CTR of €2,299,873 as a result of this transfer. The financial statements of Pairc Ui Chaoimh CTR discloses a corresponding expense in the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

The company owes monies of Nil (period ended 30 September 2021: €7,782,157) to related entities, Pairc an Chrocaigh CTR and GAA Cork County Board, entities related by virtue of common directors and officers.

The company transacts with GAA Cork County Board and its member Clubs and Divisions, Central Council and Munster Council. These transactions are reflected in the underlying records and are in the normal course of business.

The ultimate controlling party of the company is Cork County Board.

Key management personnel

All directors and senior employees who have authority and responsibility for planning, directing and controlling the activities of the company are considered to be key management personnel. No remuneration is paid to directors. Total remuneration for senior employees including pension contributions paid by the three entities of Cork GAA in respect of these personnel amounted to Nil (period ended 30 September 2021: €233,449).

14. CAPITAL COMMITMENTS

There were no material capital expenditure commitments, either contracted for or approved by the directors, at the Statement of Financial Position date.

15. EVENTS AFTER THE STATEMENT OF FINANCIAL POSITION DATE

There were no significant events affecting the Company after the Statement of Financial Position date.

For the smallest division in Cork, 2022 proved to be one of the busiest in recent years.

Having failed to field a team in the Senior Football championship in the previous 2 years, the Beara senior football team took to the field with renewed optimism. A lot of work went into the preparation of the team ahead of championship. In the first game of championship against Avondhu, Beara were defeated by 5 points. In the next round Beara defeated Muskerry by 6 points to set up a West Cork derby with neighbours Cabery. In a game played in Bantry, Carbery winners on a scoreline of 1-12 to 0-8. 25 years on from the epic county senior football finals of 1997, Beara and Castlehaven again met in a county final, this time at under 19 level in the Premier 1 final. Having defeated Nemo Rangers by 1 point in the semi final, Beara then faced the men from Union Hall. In what could only be described as a game of 2 halves, Beara won by 3 points. Well done to all involved in winning this title, after winning the Premier 1 Under 18 title last year.

Beara Community School were crowned All Ireland Colleges D Champions this year. Beara Community School overcame Limerick's Salesian College Palskenry to claim the 2022 Munster PPS U19D Munster football championship. After this success the teams attention turned to the All-Ireland series, and the All-Ireland title was secured with a 3-11 to 3-9 win over Our Ladys College, Belmullet. Well done to all involved with this great win.

2022 saw the All-Ireland Island competition taking place on Bere Island. Island teams from around the country headed to Bere Island for the weekend for both mens and ladies competitions. The final of the mens proved to be a west cork , "battle of Bantry Bay" derby between Bere Island and Whiddy Island and it was Bere Island that emerged winners to secure a famous victory. In the County Championships, Castletownbere played in the Premier Intermediate Football Championship. They defeated Na Piarasigh but suffered two 1 point defeats to Bantry and Aghada.

In the Intermediate A Championship Adrigole were defeated by Gabriel Rangers in Round 1 but recorded back to back wins over Kilshannig (eventual champions) and Ballydesmond to qualify for the quarter final. In the quarter final Adrigole lost by a point to Boherbue after extra time. In the Junior Football Championship Beara representatives Urhan defeated Kinsale in the quarter final but were defeated by eventual winners Kilmurry in the semi-final. In the open Junior B Championship Garnish defeated Deel Rovers, Grange and Shanballymore to reach the semi-final. Unfortunately they were beaten by eventual champions Diarmuid O Mathunas in the semi-final. Glengarriff suffered defeats to Deel Rovers and Shanballymore.

After the recent Covid 19 Pandemic, 2022 has been a busy year for Rebel Óg and our clubs, around the county as we endeavour to develop the skills of hurling and football in the various age groups and provide enjoyment to our younger players with practice matches, league and championship games, training sessions, various camps and coaching courses all taking place on the GAA pitches around the county

The commitment of clubs, players, club mentors and parents ensured that games in the age-bracket 12 to 17 were played countywide under the auspices of Rebel Óg, in addition to various blitzes and fun-days from U11 downwards run by the GDA's.

With the clubs still getting used to the change in our main age groups to 13, 15 & 17, this year Rebel Óg ran a fixtures program for under 12,13,14,15,16 and 17. It was great to be back to normal after our long spell under Covid..

2nd & 3rd Teams at Fe 15 & Fe17.

The purpose of this policy is twofold; to encourage the broadest possible participation in our games and to avoid player burnout. The proposed format allowed maximum flexibility for clubs, enabling them to provide a suitable games

programme for all of their players. It is hoped that this initiative will encourage more players to continue playing and reduce the fall off in player numbers from mid-teens that has been very evident in recent years. Coiste na nÓg will continue to monitor and review these competitions over the next two years.

Kelloggs Cul Camps It was great to see our Cul Camps numbers return to pre pandemic levels this year which saw over 110 Cul camps being run in the various regions with over 15,000 children taking part in Cork alone. Well done to Kevin O'Callaghan and Paudie O'Brien and all GDA's and Coaches who helped clubs run this huge undertaking again this year.

John West Féile 2022 saw a welcome return of Féile after the restrictions in 2021. And to our winners who represented Cork at national level we say well done, to Douglas, Eire Og & Lisgoold in the hurling and Douglas, Castlehaven & Killshannig in the football with Douglas completing the double. A huge thank you must go to the committees and clubs working alongside our Feile committee and Coiste officers, for all the hard work involved in arranging and hosting games and helping in the Féile tournament in Cork for 2022.

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IT. Our thanks to Terry Brady IT Officer with Cork GAA for all of his help and assistance during the year on our website and overall web development of Cork GAA which will continue going forward.

Referee recruitment/retention; This year saw Jim McEvoy take over in the role of Referee Administrator for Rebel Og, we also saw almost 70 new referees complete the Referee's course to allow them to officiate at our games going forward. However, there are as many as 35 clubs who do not provide any referee and we will be asking these clubs, in particular, to assist in providing candidates for referees courses in 2023.

A rising problem in recent times and something that has to be removed from our game is the abuse of referees from side lines. A large proportion of disciplinary matters arising during Rebel Óg games involve mentors rather than players and this trend has to cease.

Coach Education

In 2022 the Foundation Course" was replaced with the new "Introduction to Gaelic Games course" which would allow hurling, football, camogie and ladies football all be coached under the

one course. Cork provided a total of 35 Introduction to Gaelic Games courses with a total participation number of 814 coaches who availed of this new course. Three dual Award 1 Courses were held in which 58 coached participated.

Go Games

In 2022 there was a huge uptake on games for Fe7 to Fe11 as organised and provided for by our GDA's and well done to Colm Crowley for all his work in organising this.

Rebel Og Development Squads 2022

We had a busy year once again with our development squads. Our approach to 2022 was to ensure we provided enough quality coaching and games to as many players as possible at an elite level.

U14

We began the year with 8 evenly picked regional teams across the county competing in games within the county. Approx 180 players in both codes. This continued through to May. The GDAs along with volunteers ran the U14 in both codes and they had a busy season with so many players.

After May we reduced the panel sizes and number of teams and focused on 4 regional panels with 100 players. These teams played intercounty matches through to August. Countrywide there was mixed approaches, with some counties following our approach with multiple even teams and others only going with 1 strong team. When it came to the end of year competition the winners all came from counties that stuck with having 1 strong team approach. But as we learned from the past U14 success has had little relevance to success at minor and beyond with a 50% turnover of players when we used only have an A & B Panel when they moved to U15. We wanted to ensure that all players regardless of physical size get the best of training and matches for their development when moving up through the ages. I would like to thank all the Hurling and football coaches for their time and commitment they gave this year.

U15

Because of the missed year at U14 the U15 management followed a similar path the U14 by retaining as many players as possible and entering 4 county teams into Intercounty Leagues in both codes. This meant that we had 100 players playing Hurling & Football for Cork at U15 level in 2022.

At the start of the year, we ran inter regional blitzes with 8 teams across the county with support of the GDAs and volunteers. These concluded in February. At the stage Cork entered 4 teams in both intercounty league competitions that ran from March through to August.

In Hurling we joined East & North regions and City & West regions up to make 2 strong groups. In Football we retained the 4 regional teams, West, City, East and Mid

Cork.

Results in Hurling were a bit up and down throughout the year because of the nature of the competitions and approach from some counties. Again, some of the traditional counties did like us and we had very competitive games, but other counties went with 1 strong team and it effected results and games. We concluded the year with 4 teams playing in All Irelands in Tipperary.

Following the difficulties experienced by All sports but in particular indoor Handball having suffered almost two years of inactivity due to the Covid restrictions from March 2020 to late 2021 have thankfully seen a return to near normal during 2022. It has however had an impact as the loss of a two year period training and competitive games has impacted on the progress of many players. It also had impact at juvenile level with a sizable number of juveniles in the 6 to 10 age group who would have joined clubs and started off training and being coached could not be started with all facilities closed. Thankfully the opening of handball courts at the end of 2021 saw a gradual return to normal which has continued during 2022 and while there is still more ground to be made up things look more positive for the year ahead.

Cork handball Board enjoyed a reasonably good year in 2022 winning a total of twelve national titles over the three codes of handball 40/20, 60/30, and One Wall. Ballydesmonds Catriona Casey again led the way with a total of five winning 40/20 Ladies Senior Singles and 60/30 Ladies Senior Doubles partnered by her club mate Aishling O Keeffe. Catriona went on to add the Ladies One Wall Open, Ladies One Wall Nationals and 40/20 Ladies Open Nationals. John Herlihy, Conna also enjoyed a good Adam year winning two National titles,

40/20 Emerald Master A Singles All Ireland and 40/20 Emerald Masters A Nationals. At juvenile level Cork players won three National titles Amy Brosnan, Ballydesmond won 60/30 Girls U14 Singles, in One Wall Carmel Kelleher, Boherbue won Girls U16 Singles title, with Clan Dunning, Conna winning Boys U 16 Singles. It also proved to be a good year for Ballydesmond juveniles winning National Feile Na nGael titles in both 40/20 and 60/30 codes the first Cork club to win both in the same year. There was also success for Cork players in the US during the year Catriona Casey enjoyed a number of notable successes in some of the big games on. The US circuit, There was also success at USHA Intervarsities with Mallow player David Walsh representing MTU winning Men's Open Singles and partnered by Adam Walsh also went on to win Men's Open Doubles. Carmel Kelleher, Boherbue also enjoyed a notable success in recent weeks winning Girls 15 & Under Girls place on the Irish team to travel to the US at the end of December to play in the US Nationals. At provincially level Cork players adult and juvenile won a large number of titles in both Men's and Ladies. Some subsequently went out at All Ireland semi final stage but a sizable number got to All Ireland Finals an experience that will stand them in good stead in future years.

We would like to extend the sincerest thanks of Colaiste Iarbhunscoileanna Chorcaí to all the teachers who give up their time voluntarily to prepare teams for our various competitions. Without this honourable commitment we would not have an organisation at all, so thank you. Secondly I would like to thank my fellow committee members who work tirelessly to ensure the smooth running and completion of our competitions and the safeguarding of our organisation in what can only be described as unsure times for our schools.

A special word of thanks must go to Neally O'Keeffe our development officer. The work load that Neally gets through is immense and without a doubt we would not complete our expansive programme of fixtures without his input and expertise.

The continuing situation of Club games being played throughout the week under floodlights right through November coupled with their training and challenge matches leaves little time for the College panels to train. Furthermore, this overload of training and games is seriously manifesting itself in the issue of player burnout and exhaustion. A number of our members have even questioned the viability of continuing the Colleges competitions if the current situation continues. It is simply not practical to continue within the existing constraints. A decision must be made at County Board level to provide a definite window for our competitions with no Club games being played during that window.

This coupled with the changing landscape of education as evidenced with the introduction of the new JCPA and the requirement for Class Room Based Assessments in each subject will only add to the difficulty of getting games played on time and indeed competitions completed. The work of the GDAs across the county in organising First Year hurling and football blitzes

throughout the county is a welcome development. It allows schools to get all the first years that want to play with their school games and not just a select few that make the 'A' team. We would encourage such blitz days for first years who may be getting games in Cork or other competitions such as the Rice Cup.

Scór

While numbers remain high in Scór na bPáistí and Scór na nÓg, the number of clubs competing in Scór Sinsear has continued to decline despite the efforts of a very hard working committee. The timing of the county competitions which was determined by the date of the All Ireland did not help in 2022. The quality of those competing has remained high. The rest of the Rule to remain unchanged."

MAIN CHANGE – “*subject to Central Council Policy*” – is removed, and stipulation that competitions must take place at U14, U16 and U18 level.

For counties of larger populations, there is the provision to provide additional competitions at U15 and U17 if required within this rule change.

Youth Committee – Coiste na nÓg.

The Officers of the Youth Committee and its Regional Sub Committees shall be appointed annually by the County Committee on the recommendation of the Management Committee.

It shall consist of;

- (a) The County Children's Officer and the Coaching Officer of the County Committee;
- (b) Officerships – Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, Secretary, Assistant Secretary, Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, P.R.O., Referees Administrator.
- (c) One Representative of each of four Regional **Sub** Committees, East, Mid **South**, West and North; the County Games Manager.

The **County** Children's Officer having completed his term as Officer shall continue as a member of the Committee for a further one year.

It shall have four Regional Sub Committees – Mid South Region, West Region, East Region and North Region

Each of the four Regional **Sub** Committees will be comprised of the following set of Officer roles, namely Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, Secretary, Assistant Secretary, Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, P.R.O. and **Referees Secretary**.

A member may not serve for more than a maximum of five consecutive years in any officer role within Coiste na nÓg.

Subject to the jurisdiction of the County Committee and the Management Committee, the County Youth Committee shall be responsible for:

- (1) The initiation and co-ordination of all Youth activities within the County.
- (2) All underage affairs from Minor Grade (U17) downwards (except responsibility for Inter-County Minor Teams)
- (3) It shall be the sole Under-Age Fixtures making body and shall prepare a Master Fixtures Plan for all Regions to ensure a coordinated games structure in the entire County.
- (4) Promotion and Monitoring of Development in the County Schools' Committees.

The Committee shall meet at least once a month.

Coiste na nÓg shall incorporate a CCC consisting of the ~~Chairperson, Vice-chairperson, Secretary, Assistant secretary, Referees Administrator~~ **Officers of Coiste na nÓg** and a representative (~~secretary or chairperson~~) from each of the four Regional Sub-Committees. It shall be chaired by the Rebel Óg Vice-Chairperson.

Subject to the jurisdiction of the County Committee, Management Committee and Coiste na nÓg, the Coiste na nÓg Competitions Control Committee shall be responsible for:

- (1) Coiste na nÓg Fixtures. Where a change is considered necessary between meetings, the Competitions Control Committee shall consult with the Clubs involved but shall have the power to make a decision.
- (2) Appointment of Referees – whose decisions are final.
- (3) Referees' Reports – their consideration and adoption.
- (4) Discipline arising from Competitions and Games, other than those functions reserved to the County Hearings Committee.
- (5) Objections and Counter-Objections relating to or arising out of Games, with power of decision.
- (6) Gradings – Clubs and Players, with final decisions resting with the County Committee.
- (7) Transfers within the County – subject to General Rule and Byelaws.

The Competitions Control Committee shall meet at least once a month, and as often as is necessary.

Five Regional Competitions Control Sub Committees (CCC) will be established; Mid South CCC, West CCC, East CCC, North CCC and Premier CCC. These Sub Committees can include up to three Club representatives.

A Finance Sub Committee shall comprise of the Treasurers from each of the four Regional Sub Committee and the Treasurer of Coiste na nÓg who shall chair the Sub Committee.

A Public Relations Sub Committee shall comprise of the Public Relations Officers (PROs) from each of the four Regional sub-committee and the PRO of Coiste na nÓg who shall chair the Sub Committee.

A Referees Sub Committee shall comprise of the Referees Secretary from each of the four Regional Sub Committees, the Secretary of Coiste na nÓg and the Referees Administrator of Coiste na nÓg who shall chair the Sub Committee.

Rule 2.1 (p7)

A team shall consist of fifteen players. Exception: A County Committee may reduce the number for non-Championship games and for all games involving teams aged U17 group or younger, under competition regulations.

and

Rule 2.2 (p7)

A team may commence a game with two less players than the number specified under competition regulations, but shall have fielded the specified number, inclusive of players ordered off or retired injured, by the start of the second half. In the event of failure to comply with this, the game shall continue.

(b) If a Team is Disqualified or Retires during the course of the League Stage, its played Games shall stand and its unplayed Games shall be awarded to the Opposing Teams.

(c) Except where provided for otherwise in these Rules, in County Bye-Law or in Competition Regulation, when Teams finish with equal points for Qualification for the Concluding Stages, or for Promotion or Relegation, the tie shall be decided by the following means and in the order specified:

- (i) Where two Teams only are involved - the outcome of the meeting of the two Teams in the previous game in the Competition;
- (ii) Scoring Difference (subtracting the total Scores Against from total Scores For);
- (iii) Highest Total Score For;
- (iv) A Play-Off.

Exceptions to (c): Except where provided for otherwise in County Bye-Law or Competition Regulation, Regulations (i), (ii) and (iii) above shall not apply to Under 17 or younger age grade competitions.

(d) In the event that two teams or more finish with equal points, but have been affected by a disqualification, loss of game on a proven objection, retirement or walk over, the tie shall be decided by the following means:

- (i) Score Difference from the games in which only the teams involved, (teams tied on points), have played each other. (subtracting the total Scores Against from total Scores For)
- (ii) Highest Total Score For, in which only the teams involved, have played each other, and have finished equal in (i)
- (iii) A Play-Off

Seedings are outlined in each competition below, based on performances in the previous year.

Qualification two teams from each group qualify for the semi-finals / quarter-finals as outlined in each competition below.

Relegation; 'one up ,one down' in all grades.

Divisions / Colleges; one team to enter at quarter-final stage of the Premier Senior Hurling and Football Championships. Under General Rule, there is a requirement to have 16 teams or less in all Senior and Intermediate County championships in 2023, so a deviation from Rule will be sought on an annual basis.

Munster Club Competitions; Cork will be represented in Senior, Intermediate and Junior by the Premier Senior, Premier Intermediate and Premier Junior County Champions, respectively.

Draw Format & Procedure In all competitions with twelve teams (3 groups of 4), draws will take place as follows: There will be three Groups to be filled (labelled 1 to 3). There will be three A seeds, three B seeds, six C/D seeds. Firstly, the three A seeds will be placed in the bowl. Each will be drawn and placed in Groups 1 to 3 in order. Then, the three B seeds will be placed in the bowl. Each will be drawn and placed in Groups 1 to 3 in order. Then, the six C/D seeds will be placed in the bowl. Two will be drawn each time labelled C and D, and placed in Groups 1 to 3 in order.

In JBFC, which has sixteen teams. The same format will follow with four A seeds, four B seeds and eight C/D seeds being split across four Groups

U18 and U21 Competitions

Secondary competitions will be organised at U18 level by the County CCC in 2023, based on the Rebel Óg structures and regions and matches will be played midweek to avoid Adult and Minor fixtures at the weekend. The format and calendar will depend on Adult and Minor programmes.

There will be no County U21 competition organised in 2023. However, Divisions will be permitted to organise local U21 competitions from October to December at their own discretion with the provision that Adult, U18 and Minor fixtures always take precedence.

Independent teams will be permitted for U18 competitions subject to County Committee approval. Independent teams will be permitted for U21 competitions, subject to Divisional Committee approval and subsequent County Committee ratification.

(4) Winner-on-the Day The decision to apply Winner-on-the-Day regulations is at the discretion of the CCC. However, as per General Rule, there is no scope to adapt the format.

(5) National Flag & Pitch Lining The National flag is to be flown for all Championship games and pitches are to be properly lined and flagged.

(6) Panel Sizes & Backroom Team panels admitted to field area is limited to a maximum of 30 players, 15 starting players and 15 substitutes. This limit also applies to listing in the match programmes.

A maximum of 40 persons (including a maximum of 30 players) will be admitted to the playing area before and during the game. If more than 40 persons from either club are present in Field Area before or during the game, the Event Controller of the game is requested to report this to referee/fourth official. The referee and Event Controller should record this breach in their match report.

The maximum number of Officials (including two Water Carriers (Maor Uisce) per team (Football) or Water/Hurley Carriers (Maor Uisce/Camán) per team (Hurling) is to be 12 persons. All Water Carriers (Football) or Water/Hurley Carriers (Hurling) must be aged 18 or over. (Exception: There will be no water carriers while Covid-19 protocols remain in place.)

With the exception of the Bainisteoir, the Medical Officer and the two Water or Water/Hurley Carriers (who are to be provided by their Club with distinguishing armbands/bibs), all Substitutes and Officials, shall remain seated at all times during play. The Bainisteoir may go along the sideline between the two 45m lines to issue instructions, after which he must return to the area in front of his own team's dug out. He must not enter the field for any purpose.

Hurley/Water Carriers are to be positioned outside the 20m and 65m lines. Water carriers are not permitted to enter the field of play and players must only approach the sideline to receive water from a Water Carrier.

In Hurling, Hurley Carriers may enter the field with a replacement hurley during a break in place.

(7) Injuries A Team Medical Official, having obtained the expressed permission of the Referee (who may delegate authority to his linesmen), may enter the field to examine an injured player. He is not at this point, to take a medical kit onto the field. No other Team Official shall enter the field of Play for this purpose. The practice of a number of Team Officials/water carriers running onto the field to examine an injury is strictly prohibited.

Minor injuries must be treated off the field. If a blood substitute is required, the substitute may not enter the field of play until the injured player has left and the referee/fourth official has signalled his approval.

(8) Warm Up Substitutes may warm-up on the sideline area between the end line and the 20m line. A maximum of three substitutes may warm up at any one time, wearing a bib/ top, different / distinct from team jersey. No hurleys, sliotars or footballs may be used along the sideline during the warm-up.

(9) Substitute Slips Slips are to be presented by the substitute to the Referee. This may be designated to a 4th Official if one is in place.

Cork GAA Leagues 2023

A fully integrated League programme will be in place for 2023, incorporating all teams in the county in one overall structure, consisting of County Senior Leagues and Divisional Junior Leagues with progression between both levels.

The Senior Leagues will consist of seven divisions, in both Hurling and Football, each with ten teams, except for Divisions 6 and 7 which will have 8 teams each. The Divisional Junior Leagues will run, as before, but now linked to Division 7 through promotion and relegation.

In all seven Divisions the top two teams will meet in a League Final, with both teams being promoted. The bottom two teams in each Division will be relegated.

The bottom two teams in Division 7 of both the Hurling and Football Leagues will be relegated to their respective Divisional Junior League. The bottom team will be replaced by the winner of the same Divisional Junior League to which they are relegated. The second bottom team will be replaced by the County Junior A Championship winners.

If the County Junior A Championship winners are already in the County Senior Leagues, the second bottom placed team will instead be replaced by the winner of the same Divisional Junior League to which they are relegated.

If any team withdraws or if two teams from the same Division are relegated, the same principle will follow. Their place will go to the next best placed team from their Division, ensuring that Divisional Leagues will also have even numbers insofar as is possible.

Teams that are relegated in Championships shall retain their League status as both competitions are decoupled.

League Regulations

(1) Correspondence All correspondence in relation to fixtures is to be submitted from the Club Secretary's official email to the County Secretary's official email administrator.cork@gaa.ie

(2) Completion Dates The completion date for the group stage is June 18th for Football and June 25th for Hurling. League Finals will take place on the weekend of July 2nd in Football and July 9th in Hurling.

(3) Venue The first named team has home venue, but if this venue is not available, the game will be played at the opponent's venue or at neutral venue. The national flag is to be flown for all league games and pitches are to be properly lined and flagged.

(3) Referee Where the appointed referee fails to attend, agreement must be reached between the two clubs on a substitute referee by either tossing or by agreement. Failure to comply will result in forfeiture of the league points by the club or clubs failing to agree. In the event of a referee being agreed by both clubs it is the responsibility of the club of the referee to ensure that the official report of the game is submitted within three days of the game. If the agreed referee is not a member of either participating club, the responsibility for ensuring the report is submitted shall rest with the home club.

(4) Fixtures All fixtures listed at the start of the year are thereby ratified for the dates / times outlined.

Request for Postponement / Change

Any request for changes to the listed time and / or date must be sent from the club secretary's official email to the county secretary's official email administrator.cork@gaa.ie at least five days in advance of the fixture. No postponements shall be granted thereafter, except in exceptional circumstances.

If a fixture is to be changed, the following criteria must be met:

- Both clubs must email administrator.cork@gaa.ie referencing the fixture involved, both outlining the same reason for change of fixture and both listing the same new agreed re-fixture date / time.
- The re-fixture date must be on / before the same date in the following month and on / before the group stage deadline. For example, a match postponed on March 15th must be re-fixed to be played on a date on or before April 15th before postponement is granted.
- If the request is approved by CCC, the new date / time becomes a ratified fixture, and the fixture list will be updated accordingly.
- All fixtures are subject to a limit of two postponements. On the third postponement, the fixture become null and void or a walkover is granted.
- If two clubs fail to agree on either postponement or a re-fixture date, the fixture stands. A club may then unilaterally request a change of fixture from the CCC for exceptional reasons, stating clearly that agreement between the clubs does not apply.

Unfulfilled Fixtures / Walkovers

- A fine of €100 per team will apply for each unfulfilled fixture, unless a walkover is given by one of the teams. Walkovers will be awarded automatically where one of the teams involved fails to fulfil or indicates their intention not to fulfil a fixture without the joint submission of an agreed re-fixture date. A fine of €200 will apply to the relevant team in each case. Disputes in relation to the non-fulfilment of a fixture will be referred to the CCC.
- If a club is disqualified or retires during the course of the league, its played games shall stand and its unplayed games awarded to the opposing teams. A fine of €200 per game will apply.
- Where clubs in the same league group are due to meet in championship later in the same year, this will not merit postponement or cancellation.

(5) Substitutions Up to nine (9) substitutions shall be permitted in the playing of normal time in all games in the County Leagues and Secondary Competitions under the jurisdiction of Coiste Chontae Chorcaí. Rule 2.4, Rules of Specification, Official Guide, Part 2 sections (ii), (iii), (iv) and (v) shall not be affected by this deviation. A maximum of three substitutes remains for extra-time in play-offs, where played.

(6) Match results by text The Referee is responsible for returning all match results and will receive a text message prior to the commencement of the game.

(7) League Placings The following Regulations shall apply as per Rule 6.21 of the Official Guide:

(a) League results shall be credited as follows: 2 points for a win, and one for a draw.

(b) If a Team is Disqualified or Retires during the course of the League Stage, its played Games shall stand and its unplayed Games shall be awarded to the Opposing Teams.

(c) Except where provided for otherwise in these Rules, in County Bye-Law or in Competition Regulation, when Teams finish with equal points for Qualification for the Concluding Stages, or for Promotion or Relegation, the tie shall be decided by the following means and in the order specified:

- (i) Where two Teams only are involved - the outcome of the meeting of the two Teams in the previous game in the Competition;
- (ii) Scoring Difference (subtracting the total Scores Against from total Scores For);
- (iii) Highest Total Score For;
- (iv) A Play-Off.

Exceptions to (c): Except where provided for otherwise in County Bye-Law or Competition Regulation, Regulations (i), (ii) and (iii) above shall not apply to Under 17 or younger age grades.

(d) In the event that two teams or more finish with equal points, but have been affected by a disqualification, loss of game on a proven objection, retirement or walk over, the tie shall be decided by the following means:

- (i) Score Difference from the games in which only the teams involved, (teams tied on points), have played each other. (subtracting the total Scores Against from total Scores For)
- (ii) Highest Total Score For, in which only the teams involved, have played each other, and have finished equal in (i)
- (iii) A Play-Off

(8) League Play-offs In each Division, the top two teams will play in the Final.

(9) Promotion / Relegation 'Two up, two down' in each Division.

(10) League Prizes In each Division the prize fund will be as follows: Winners €1,000, Runners-up €500.

Extra-Time & Winner-on-the-Day Regulations

Regulations to be approved by Ard Chomhairle in January 2023 and in accordance with Rules of Specification 3.4. & 3.5 T.O. Part 2 2022, that relevant games that are “Winner on the Day” should be completed as follows:

Phase 1

- Proceed to Extra time as provided for in T.O Cuid II (two periods of ten minutes each way)

Phase 2 (Penalty Kicks/Pucks)

If still level, a “penalty competition” to decide the outcome:

- The relevant rules in T.O. Cuid II shall apply in relation to Penalty Kicks/Pucks, unless otherwise stated.
- Penalties will be taken for goals only.
- The Referee shall choose the end at which the penalty kicks/pucks will be taken. The end may be changed by the referee if it becomes unplayable during the course of the penalties.
- The Referee will ensure two goal umpires are in place at the end in which the penalty kicks/pucks are to be taken;
 - Both umpires shall position themselves on the end line at opposite side of the goals facing inwards
 - If a penalty is scored, the goal umpire, will wave the green flag once the referee has signaled
 - If the penalty is saved or missed the point umpire will signal a wide once the referee has signaled
- Only players who are on the field of play at the end of Phase 1 (i.e., end of Extra Time), shall be allowed to be registered as a penalty taker or goalkeeper. **Exception:** The substitute goalkeeper can come from the team panel.
- Each team shall register five penalty takers, a goalkeeper & a substitute goalkeeper with the referee and indicate in which order the penalty takers will take their penalties. (A penalty taker can also be a goalkeeper or a substitute goalkeeper, provided they were on the field at the end of the phase 1.)
- The Referee shall toss a coin in the presence of the two captains to see which team will have the option of going first.
- Subject to the conditions below both teams will take five penalty kicks/pucks which are taken alternately by the teams. The game is awarded to whichever team scores more of their five penalty kicks/pucks
 - If, before both teams have taken five penalty kicks/pucks, one team has scored more goals than the other team could score, even if they were to complete their five penalty kicks/pucks, no more penalty kicks/pucks shall be taken
 - If, after both teams have taken five penalty kicks/pucks and both teams have scored the same number of goals, the penalty competition will continue but in sudden death format using the same five registered players until one team has scored a goal more than the other from the same number of kicks/pucks.
 - In sudden death, the same sequence of penalty takers does not have to be followed as in the first round of penalty kicks/pucks.
- Each penalty kick/puck is taken by a different player. All registered players must take a penalty kick/puck before any player can take an additional penalty kick/puck.
- The referee shall signal for the penalty to be taken. The penalty kick/puck is completed when the ball stops moving, goes out of play (including over the crossbar) or a goal is scored.
- Only the players involved in the penalty taking competition, as well as the Referee, Linesmen and Umpires are permitted on the pitch. With the registered penalty takers located between the 45m & 65m lines closest to the end selected by the referee. Goalkeepers to be located

20m from the goals.

- All other players (including substitute goalkeepers), managers, officials, backroom personnel etc. should be at their designated sideline area, and off the field of play when the penalty-taking competition is taking place.
- A goalkeeper who is injured (or sent off) while the penalty kicks/pucks are being taken and is unable to continue as a goalkeeper may be replaced* by the substitute goalkeeper who has been nominated in advance, provided the referee is notified. If in the event the substitute goalkeeper also gets injured, one of the registered penalty takers may replace* the substitute goalkeeper, provided the referee is notified.
(*Once replaced, the goalkeeper/ substitute goalkeeper cannot be reintroduced as a goalkeeper at a later stage).
- In the event the goalkeeper who is injured while the penalty kicks/pucks are being taken and is unable to continue and is also a registered penalty taker, they may be replaced by a player who was on the field of play at the end of Phase 1 (i.e., end of Extra Time), provided the change is approved by the referee. If the goalkeeper has taken a penalty, the replacement cannot take a penalty until the next round of penalties.
- In the event a registered penalty taker is sent off by the referee while the penalty kicks/pucks are being taken, they may be replaced by a player who was on the field of play at the end of Phase 1 (i.e., end of Extra Time), provided the change is approved by the referee. If the sent off player has taken a penalty, the replacement cannot take a penalty until the next round of penalties.

At a meeting in the Victoria Hotel, Cork on December 27th 1884, the first meeting of the Gaelic Athletic Association following the founding meeting in Thurles, the now famous letter from Most Rev. T.W. Croke, Archbishop of Cashel and Emly, accepting an invitation to him to become a Patron of the Association was read:

DR. CROKE'S LETTER

THE PALACE, THURLES,
18th December, 1884

My Dear Sir,

I beg to acknowledge receipt of your communication inviting me to become a patron of the Gaelic Athletic Association, of which you are, it appears, the Hon. Secretary. I accede to your request with the utmost pleasure.

One of the most painful, let me assure you, and at the same time, one of the most frequently recurring reflections that, as an Irishman I am compelled to make in connection with the present aspect of things in the country is derived from the ugly and irritating fact that we are daily importing from England, not only her manufactured goods, which we cannot help doing since she has practically strangled our own manufacturing appliances, but together with her fashions, her accents, her vicious literature, her music, her dances and her manifold mannerisms, her games, also her pastimes, to the utter discredit of our own grand national sports and to the sore humiliation, and as I believe, of every genuine son and daughter of the old land.

Ball playing, hurling, football-kicking according to Irish rules, 'casting', leaping in various ways, wrestling, hand-grips, toe-pegging, leap-frog, rounders, tip-the-hat, and all such other exercises and amusements, amongst men and boys may now be said to be not only dead and buried, but in several localities to be entirely forgotten and unknown. And what have we got in their stead? We have got such foreign and fantastic field sports as lawn tennis, polo, cricket and the like - very excellent I believe, and health giving exercises in their ways, still not racy of the soil, but rather alien, on the contrary to it, as are, indeed for the most part, the men and women who first imported, and still continue to patronise them.

And unfortunately, it is not our national sports alone that are held in dishonour and are dying out, but even our most suggestive national celebrations are being gradually effaced and extinguished, one after another as well. Who hears now of snap-apple night, pan-cake night, bon-fire night? They are all things of the past, too vulgar to be spoken of, except in ridicule by the degenerate dandies of the day. No doubt there is something rather pleasing to the eye in the get-up of a modern young man, who arrayed in light attire, with parti-coloured cap on and racquet in hand is making his way, with or without a companion, to the tennis ground. But for my part, I should vastly prefer to behold or to think of, the youthful athletes, whom I used to see in my early days at fair or pattern, bereft of shoes and coat, and thus prepared to play at handball, to fly over any number of horses, to throw the 'sledge' or 'winding-stones' and to test each other's mettle and actively by the trying ordeal of 'threeleaps' or a 'hop, step and jump'.

Indeed if we continue travelling for the next score years in the same direction that we have been going for some time past, condemning the sports that were practised by our fore-fathers, effacing our national features as though we were ashamed of them, and putting on, with England's stuffs and broadcloths, her masher habits and such other effeminate follies as she may recommend, we had better at once, and publicly, abjure our nationality, clap our hands for joy at the sight of the Union Jack, and place 'England's bloody red' exultantly above the green.

Deprecating, as I do, any such dire and disgraceful consumption, and seeing in your society of athletes something altogether opposed to it, I shall be happy to do all for it that I can, and authorise you now formally to place my name on the roll of patrons.

In conclusion, I earnestly hope that our national journals will not disdain in future to give suitable notice of these Irish sports and pastimes which your society means to patronise and promote, and that the masters and pupils of our Irish Colleges will not henceforth exclude from the Athletic programmes such manly exercises as I have referred to and commemorated.
